

Officials seek relief for huge city sewer program

An attempt will be made to cut into that \$3.7 million sewer priority list put together by Service Director Anthony J. Giunta.

COUNCILMAN FRANK J. CHUKAYNE and his finance committee will meet within the week to try to find money to offset that huge amount for the sewer program. So far, just \$486,000 has been earmarked for sewer repair or replacement.

Chukayne, Giunta and Councilman Joseph M. Farrell met last week with Finance Director Donald J. Sheppard in an attempt to iron out money problems related to sewers.

Farrell had wanted the city to look to revenue sharing and councilmanic bonds to come up with \$1.5 million for a sewer program. Sheppard rejected that plan of action.

"Mr. Sheppard briefed us on the budget and indi-

cated, from his view, that nothing could be done," Chukayne said, adding, "unless there were changes in the budget."

So the finance committee, chaired by Chukayne, will meet shortly to see if anything further can be done.

THE COMMITTEE WILL ALSO HAVE to take into consideration the negotiations still going on between the administration and the city employee unions, including the safety forces. Those negotiations certainly will have

an effect on the entire budget, including money being pegged or what could be pegged for sewer improvements.

Meanwhile, Service Director Giunta has a priority list of sewer improvement that could relieve all the flooded basements in the city, he said.

But the problem is money.
"My function as director is to show councilmen what (SEE PAGE 4)

Grabow signs violate new sign statute

Campaign signs for a candidate for county commissioner which dot the city violate the new sign ordinance.

"The signs violate the law 100 percent," said Building Commissioner Robert Drobnick.

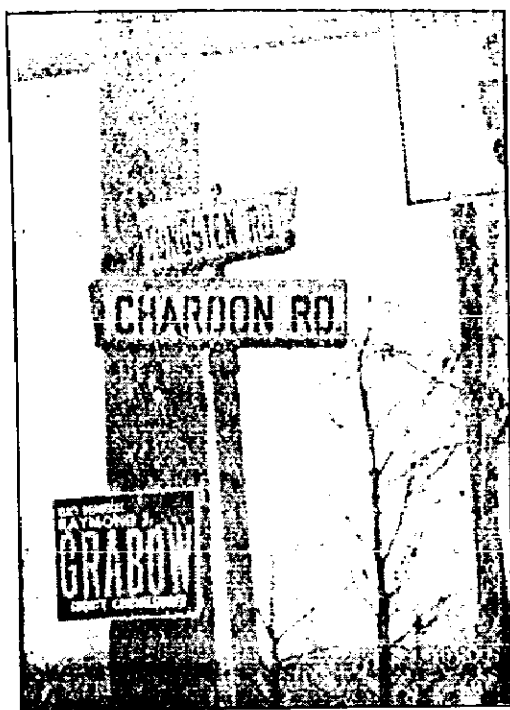
THE PLACARDS PROMOTE the candidacy of Warrensville Heights Mayor Raymond J. Grabow, a Democrat in a bid for county commissioner.

The signs are posted throughout the city, mostly on telephone poles. No political signs can be posted on public property, according to the building commissioner.

Also, Grabow may have gotten a jump on other candidates in the way of political paraphernalia, but along the way he violated another aspect in the sign ordinance, Drobnick reported. No political signs can be posted until 30 days before an election. In this case, it would be 30 days before the May 7 primary election. Grabow had posted them about 60 days before the primary, according to the terms of the new sign ordinance which has been in effect only a couple of months.

DROBNICK HAS ATTEMPTED to contact Grabow but has been unsuccessful. He has left telephone messages at his Warrensville Heights City Hall office for the last week, but to no avail. Also, the commissioner has tried to get in touch with Grabow's campaign manager at this headquarters at 20979 Ellacott Pkwy. Nobody has answered a telephone call there.

Grabow or somebody at his campaign headquarters also have been unsuccessful.

Drobnick is awaiting word from the Warrensville Heights mayor.

"I'll explain the requirements of our sign ordinance to him and ask him to comply," Drobnick said. "If he goes along with it, then there won't be any problems."

City council revives 3 percent motel tax

Talk of a three percent hotel and motel room tax in the city has been revived by council.

Council President Michael Kosmetos asked at the meeting this week that council's finance committee take up the subject of the tax at its next session, probably in a week.

KOSMETOS SAID THE CITY could net up to \$50,000 a year from the tax. Since there aren't any hotels in the city, the motels which would face the brunt of the tax would be Charter House Motor Hotel, 24800 Euclid Ave., Sheraton Motor Inn, 27981 Euclid Ave., and Howard Johnson's Motor Lodge, 27861 Euclid Ave.

DISCUSSION OF THE TAX first came before Euclid legislators about a year and a half ago. But a court case was pending and the uncertainty of the previous council over the legality of such a tax delayed vigorous consideration of the measure until now. The Ohio Supreme Court has since ruled that municipalities can levy the tax against motel and hotel proprietors.

At the council meeting on Monday, members referred to committee a law which would require fire detectors in apartments. The ordinance was triggered, according to the council president who

sponsored it, by a rash of fires at apartment buildings throughout the county and by the blaze last year at the Watergate Apartment high rise which took the life of a Euclid woman. Councilman Edward J. Eckart suggested that consideration for requiring fire extinguishers in each apartment unit be included in committee study.

ACTING MAYOR T.J. Sustarsic will be looking into the concept of a "service office" for the elderly. Councilmen indicated that steps should be taken to have an office set up at City Hall which would guide programs for Euclid senior citizens. There has

been \$10,000 in revenue sharing funds allocated for such an office, but the funds were not expended. Council President Kosmetos said the fund was set up to show council's intent to get into this area. However, since then the opening of a social security office in Euclid and the Recreation Commission's activity in this area have deflated council's intent somewhat, he said.

THE CHAIN CROSSING the Lake Shore Blvd. entrance to Cleveland Trust at East 264th St. will be taken down to facilitate parking in the area, according to a resolution passed by council.

Landmark rezoning case

Chase trial in session

The controversial Chase Brass tubing mill property rezoning trial appears to be underway.

Arguments challenging the rezoning are to be heard the remainder of this week. Those in favor of it are to present their case sometime early next week.

At press time late Tuesday, there was no word that this schedule would be altered.

THE TRIAL IS BEING HELD in Cuyahoga County Common Pleas Court with Judge James Kilcoyne presiding.

Two lawsuits charging that the rezoning of the 75 acres of Chase property is unconstitutional were consolidated about a month ago. They were court actions filed by Alfred Milton Roemisch and Henry A. Loesch, and Carl Milstein, a prominent developer.

Their lawsuit seeks an injunction to block the city of Euclid from issuing building permits for commercial development of the Chase property. At the same time, it attempts to block developer Jacobs, Visconsi and Jacobs Co. from seeking building permits to construct a multimillion dollar shopping mall on the land.

SHOULD THE TRIAL proceed on schedule, the next

week and a half would be plenty of time to hear arguments on both sides of the case. Then Judge Kolcoyne could have another week to let the case stew before he could make his decision known.

At this point it is difficult, if not impossible, to speculate on what the decision of the judge might be.

He has a couple of courses to take. IF MILSTEIN & CO. are refused the injunction and decide against appeal, then developer J.V.J. can proceed with the super mall.

If Milstein and others challenging the rezoning would appeal that decision, then J.V.J. is still free to proceed unless the Milstein group puts up a bond, probably in the millions of dollars, to cover any losses the city or J.V.J. might incur.

The opponents could put up the million dollar bond and appeal the decision. If they lose an appeal, the bond is forfeited.

The opponents of the rezoning would then have to decide if they wanted a further appeal before the Ohio State Supreme Court and then to the U. S. Supreme (SEE PAGE 4)

Shore uplift may be soon

A Shore Center merchant has predicted that some sort of refurbishment will take place there before the year comes to an end.

Jerry Bohinc Jr., along with his brother, James, own Northeast Appliance, an appliance and furniture store at 22530 Lake Shore Blvd.

BOHINC SAID THE PARKING LOT between Shore Center Dr. and Lake Shore Blvd. will be the focus of the facelift.

The merchant predicted that the ugly posts protruding from the pavement in that area will be removed. This will allow the traffic flow to be improved. An added touch would be greenery planted throughout the area. Some merchants may even clean up some of the sore spots at the rear of their buildings which face the parking lot, he said.

All of this could be the first phase of a two phase project to upgrade the area, Bohinc said. He said mer-

chants will be meeting within the next month to lay the groundwork for the multi-phase project.

"I'm optimistic that something will be done this year," Bohinc said. "Within a month I'm hopeful that the merchants will come to a general agreement."

The second phase, which would involve long range planning and greater expense, could include new lighting for the parking lot and new facades for the rear entrances of the buildings, entrances which face the lot.

For now, Bohinc said merchants could concentrate on getting this initial phase in action. It could lead to a snowballing effect to insure the total redevelopment of the area, he reasoned.

"The cost of Phase 1 would be relatively reasonable," Bohinc said. When asked if he would be willing to invest into the first phase, he responded, "Sure. Somebody has to pay for it." He said a pro-rated sharing of the cost would be the equitable way to handle financing of the entire project.

BOHINC STRESSED that any action toward a renewed Shore Center must have the support of the community. "The community has a vested interest in keeping Shore Center viable. Community support is the best thing to have," the merchant said.

Bohinc said Shore Center is beginning to show problems of any aging shopping center. He said it is now left with the community to breathe new life into it or have it "go downhill." "The community has to begin to show new direction. It can do what a mature community does or it can go downhill. I want it to mature," he said.

"Shore Center is unique. The beauty of it is in the way it is laid out physically. If we could have a successful upgrading of the district, the end result could be phenomenal for shoppers," he concluded.

Northeast Appliance is an appliance and furniture store which was started by the elder Bohinc, Jerry Sr., in 1948. He remains semi-active in the company despite his retirement.

Euclid artist Thaddeus Konar is living a dream come true.

Like so many other men and women who have sailed the oceans in search of that seemingly mythical land of opportunity called the United States, Thaddeus Konar left his Polish homeland to find a better life and fulfill that dream.

THAT WAS FOUR-and-a-half years ago. Today Ted, as his name is translated into English, has found himself in the midst of a thriving business that coincides with the driving force in his life.

Ted is the owner of Euclid Monuments, located at 455 East 222 St. What sets him apart from other people in the same line of work is his background.

For you see, Ted is a gifted artist and sculptor, a talent which he transmits into the monuments he designs.

A 1968 graduate of the Kanar Art School nestled in the countryside of Poland, Ted is one of only a handful of artists who complete the rigorous instruction each year.

THAT SAME YEAR saw student unrest explode into violence in Poland. It was then that Ted decided to leave the land of his birth

and seek his fortune elsewhere.

"I really didn't decide to go to America right away," remarked Ted in surprisingly proper English for the relatively short while he has been here. "Western Europe attracted me so I spent about a year in Italy, France, and Germany. But I just couldn't make a living there. I did everything from driving a limousine to shop work."

Nearing the close of 1969, Ted arrived in the United States, able to speak very little of the language and without any friends, much money, or a job. He proceeded to make his way to Cleveland and began job hunting using the Yellow Pages as a guide.

"I LOOKED IN THE phone book and saw the name Kotecki. The name looked Polish and monuments I related to art. So I called them and asked to speak to someone who knew Polish. I explained my situation to the man and he hired me over the phone."

By January 14, 1970, Ted was manager of Kotecki Monuments.

On January 15, 1972, he opened his own business, Euclid Monuments, and

has been successful ever since.

TED IS CURRENTLY attending the Cleveland Institute of Art, enrolled in a second year independent study and work type of class.

As part of his art projects, Ted has created two masterful abstract wood sculptures which he will display at the prestigious May Show at the Cleveland Art Museum. He has (SEE PAGE 4)

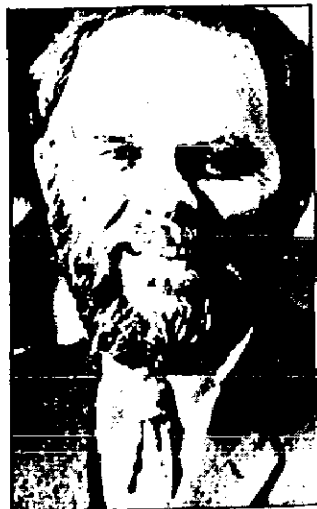
Teaching," "Values Clarification," "Clarifying Values Through Subject Matter," and "Wad-Ja-Get?"





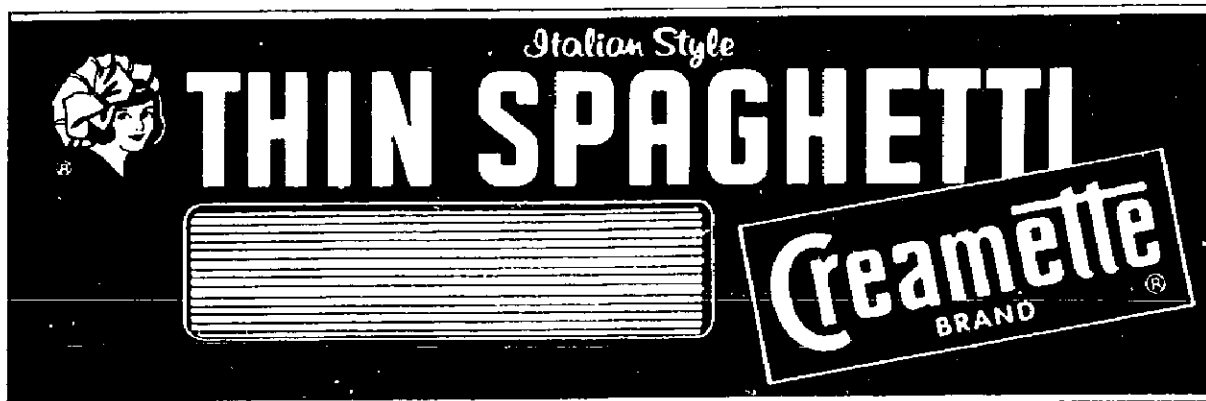

Dateline: City Hall

Buying a home is probably the one single largest investment the average family will make. Yet surprising as it may seem, the department of Commerce statistics show that this same family moves at least once every seven years according to the national average.

If you are living in Euclid and wish to sell your home, you should be aware of what the City of Euclid's Division of Housing has to say.

Number one - make application for Certificate of Inspection. A non returnable fee of \$15.00 is required.

A Housing Inspector will call and make an appointment to inspect your property. If the home is

still occupied, the owner or agent must accompany the inspector.

If there are no violations a Certificate will be issued which is valid for 90 days from date of inspection.

O.K.? You still with me? If violations are found, a notice to the effect citing the Housing Ordinances will be sent to you allowing you thirty days to comply.

When the Housing Department is notified that the violations have been taken care of, a Certificate of Inspection will be issued if the work is satisfactorily completed. Again, the Certificate is valid for 90 days from date of completion.

Now get this . . . The responsibility of correcting the violations rests

with you the seller. If for some reason you do not wish to make the corrections, an agreement may be entered into with the buyer has been properly notified of the violations and agrees to assume the responsibility for correcting them, he can sign an agreement holding you blameless.

Then it becomes a matter between the Housing Department and the new owner. Forms are available at the Housing Department, Euclid City Hall, 585 East 22nd St.

If you are buying a home here in Euclid, do not sign any papers until you have seen an inspection report, advises the Housing Commissioner.

THAT WOULD MEAN THAT GRABOW would have to recharge his campaign workers into the community and have them remove the signs from public property.

However, if the candidate refuses to comply with the ordinance, then the city law department would be called in.

"If we get no cooperation, we'll have to review it with the law department. This is our first experience with this," Drobnick said.

A stalemate would bring up the questions such as whose responsibility would it be to take down the signs? Would the city take them down and assess the cost for manpower against the candidate? What penalties are connected with these violations?

The building commissioner added that there is also the possibility that Grabow could be violating state statutes.

IN A RELATED MATTER, the huge campaign sign in the front of the headquarters of Simonelli for State Representative had to be taken down. The sign violated the sign ordinance, too. Drobnick said Councilman Frederick J. Simonelli was quick to comply with the new ordinance.

Court. Either way, the courts could decide even against hearing the case.

Of course, the judge could grant the Milstein group a permanent injunction against building permits for the property and it would have won the controversial rezoning case at this point. The judge would have concluded that the city and J.V. are wrong and that the rezoning is, indeed, unconstitutional.

THAT WOULD FORCE PROPONENTS of the mall to appeal their case before a higher court, the Cuyahoga County Court of Appeals. If that court would uphold the lower court, then chances for a huge mall on the property would be pretty slim.

Proponents of the rezoning would then have to consider an appeal to the Ohio high court or the U. S. Supreme Court. They, too, could choose not to hear the case.

This may give you an idea of what the Common Pleas Court Judge has to consider.

THEN TOO THERE COULD BE further delays in court not anticipated and the outcome would be months, even years away.

Mini bus seen for city transit

Councilman Frederick J. Simonelli, member of council's Transportation Committee, has requested an Administration study of a new line of mini-buses for possible use in the city of Euclid.

The mini-buses, manufactured in Kent, Ohio, seat 25 persons and are more economical to operate than the larger conventional motor coaches, Simonelli said.

"We are constantly exploring further ways to improve service and reduce our operating deficit," Simonelli said, "and I think that the use of mini-buses on off-hour and

weekend runs might be worth closer examination. The small, 25 passenger mini-bus I've inspected use considerably less fuel than the larger coaches and would seem to be adequate for some of the convenience runs the city operates presently at much less than full capacity."

Councilman Simonelli has turned over full specifications on the mini-bus to the Euclid Transportation Department.

When is the city going to paint the white stripes on Babbitt Rd.?

The paint, worn out after a long winter, will be redone when the weather warms and as the pavement gets warmer. It will probably be the first part of May, according to Capt. Henry Wilker, of staff services of the Euclid Police Department.

What are the rules governing bicycle riding in the city of Euclid? J.S.

Cyclists are subject to the same rules and regulations as motorists, i.e., stopping at red lights and stop signs, riding on the right side of the road, etc. A rule that is not being observed, however, is the registration of bicycles with the police department. For 25c bicyclists are issued license plates and serial numbers. That serial number is used many times to find owners of recovered bicycles. The police department has a locker full of unclaimed bicycles -- ones with no serial number and, consequently, an owner who failed to get license plates.

What is the population of the city? I.D.
According to the U.S. Census Bureau 1970 census, Euclid's population is 71,552. That is an average of 2.85 persons per household.

Who can give me both sides of the issue of nonpartisan primary elections here? N.F.

The issue is divided between Democrats and Coalitionists on council. Council President Michael Kosmetos a Coalitionist, appears to take the forefront against the primary, while Democratic Councilman Patrick E. Talty is up front favoring it.

has to be done. They have to get the money to do the work. I can't do it," lamented the service director.

GIUNTA SAID HIS PRIORITY LIST gives council an idea of what has to be done year by year. He said that each year the list grows.

"Eventually we'll have to replace all the sewers in the city. The old system that has been good for so many years is now wearing out," he said.

Giunta, noting that there are about 560 miles of sanitary and storm sewers in Euclid, said the culprit to flooded basements here is when the storm sewers, worn out over years, empties into the sanitary sewers and overloads them.

AT THE TOP OF HIS LIST is the proposed retention basin at Euclid Ave. and East 222 St. The cost for that job is \$400,000, but the service director is hopeful that a federal grant can be secured to help pay for it.

It's graduation for Heidi

Hidden away on a farm 38 miles west of Detroit is the secret weapon of most of the major police forces in the United States.

It is the training ground for special police dogs who can track a man through a bog or city streets, detect bombs hidden in vehicles or buildings and help roundup and detain criminal suspects once they have been located.

IT IS ALSO the training ground for Heidi, the marijuana sniffing German Shepherd purchased by the Euclid Police Department. She has been training for about six months with the last eight weeks with her present owner and cohort, Detective Domonic Bosco of Euclid.

Chuck G. Art, 53, is the owner and trainer at the Police K-9 School located at 9721 Brookville Rd., Plymouth, Mich. He is the fourth generation of dog trainers, with his forebears having schools in Germany.

"There is not much money in what I am doing," said Art. "I am here to save lives and then to make some money on the outside from sales."

THE DOG PURCHASED by the Euclid Police cost \$1,800 and is primarily considered a drug dog.

"The dogs which we have can sniff out a packet of marijuana even if it is carefully wrapped and hidden in a car or building," said Art. He is an expert on the various types of drugs, bombs and criminal methods.

A dog is not given to just any man in a department which orders a dog.

"We interview the man, his wife, his children and inspect his record. He must have children, for only a child can talk and love an animal in the right way with a touch and a kiss," said Art.

BOSCO, 46, a 22 year veteran of the Euclid force, spent eight weeks in the fields and farmland accustoming himself to Heidi and vice versa.

"She is just like one of the family, now," said Bos-

co, who lost about 15 pounds during the training period. Part of the training also involves actual tracking and sniffing for drugs in Detroit. Bosco also brought Heidi home for three or four weekends and helped the Narcotic and Vice unit of Euclid in several drug raids.

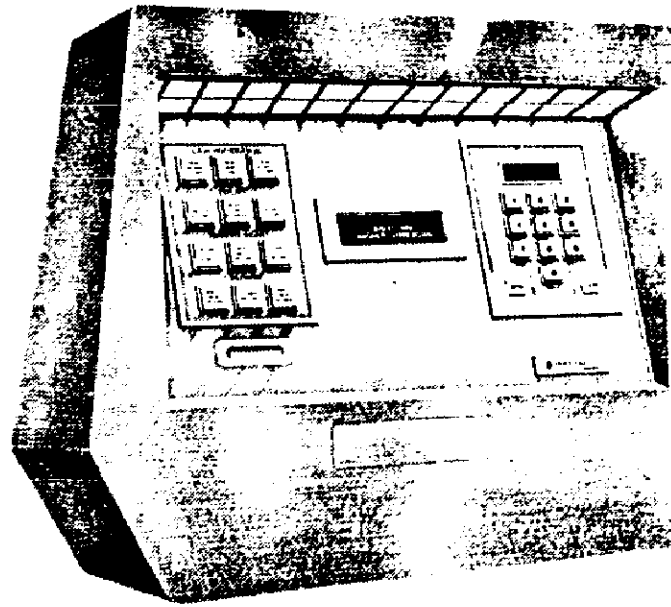

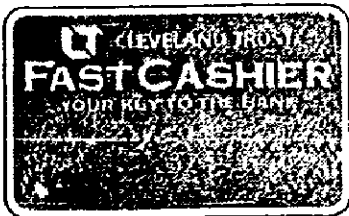

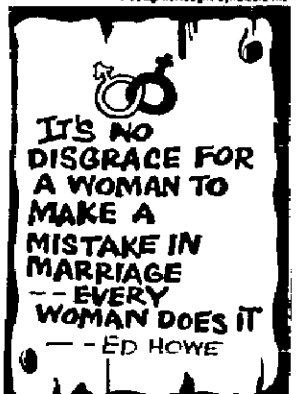

Women voters

The process of impeaching President Nixon has begun. The House of Representatives is conducting an inquiry into the President's activities to determine whether there is solid evidence to recommend impeachment by the House. This is the first step in the impeachment process. Whether the process will run its full course depends on the results of the present inquiry.

The League has NO position on whether or not there are grounds for impeaching President Nixon. The League DOES have a commitment to broaden citizen understanding of government processes and to make those processes as open, responsible and responsive

to citizens as possible. It is out of this commitment that the League presents these facts on the constitutional process of impeachment.

Impeachment is a misunderstood word. People are using it to describe the whole constitutional process by which the American people, through their representatives in Congress, judge whether a public official should be removed. Strictly speaking, it applies to one crucial step in that process. In the narrow definition, "impeachment" means the formal majority vote in the House of Representatives that accuses a public official, such as the president, of having committed "impeachable offenses." This vote does NOT remove the president from office. It does mean that he will then be tried in the Senate to determine whether he is innocent or guilty of the

Articles of Impeachment (the charges).

If there is a majority vote in the House of Representatives on one or more of the Articles of Impeachment, the House then selects one or more of its members to prosecute the impeachment in the Senate. In an impeach-

ment trial the Senate becomes the courtroom, the House members (Managers) are the prosecutors, the chief justice of the U.S. Supreme Court is

the judge and the senators are the jury. The president is represented by the attorneys of his choice. If any of the charges receives a two thirds yeas vote, the Senate has the power to remove the president from office and disqualify him from holding any future public office. If the vote falls short of two thirds, the president would stay in office, though he would remain liable for indictment and conviction by the federal courts.

The Constitution lists "treason, bribery, high crimes and misdemeanors," as impeachable offenses. Not all these terms have been precisely defined by law or legal precedent. One purpose of the House of Representatives' present inquiry is to define "impeachable offenses."

Currently, the House has many resolutions on impeachment to deal with. They are before the House Judiciary Committee, which is holding the INQUIRY into whether there is justification for the House to vote the formal accusation (for impeachment).

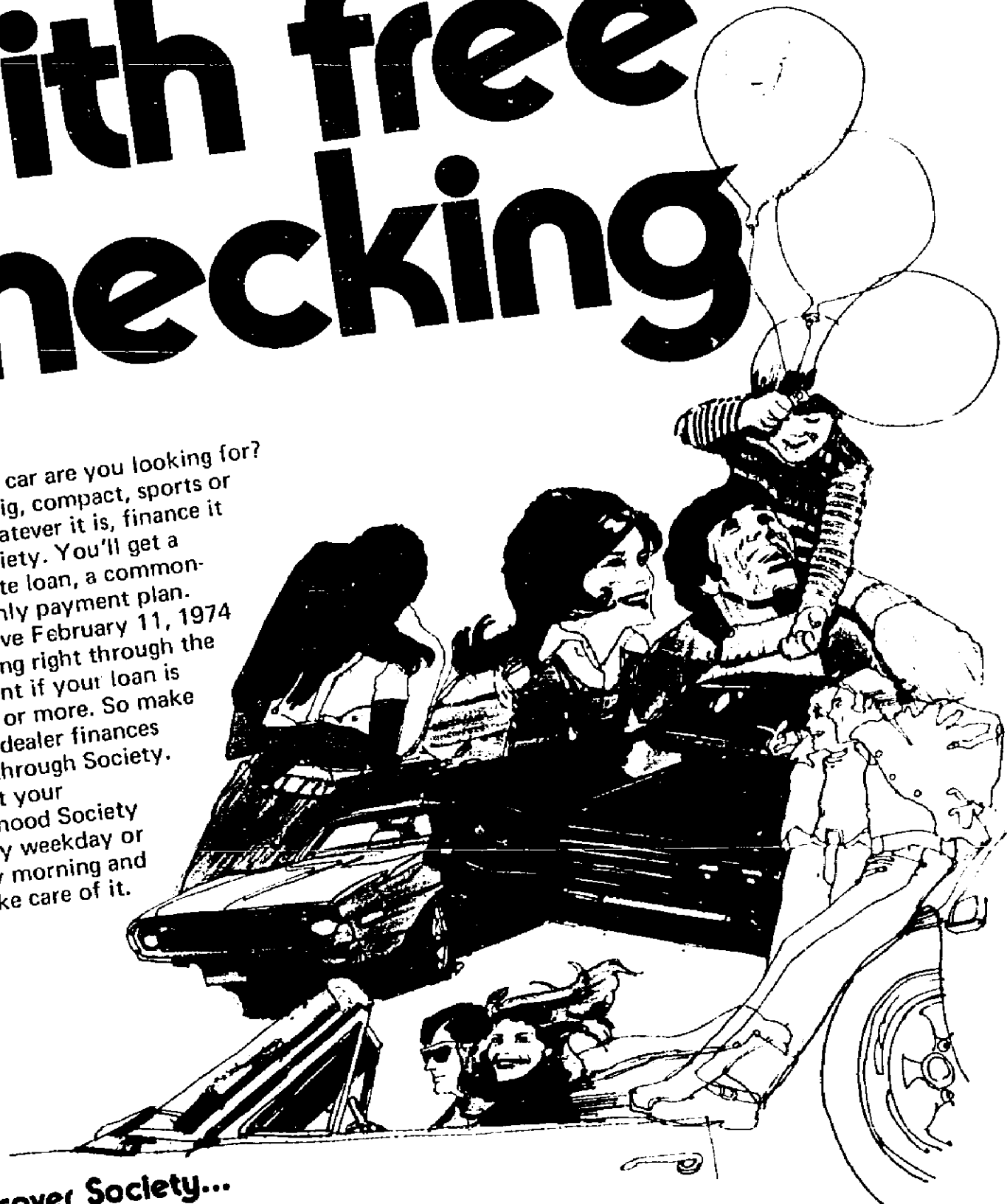

Eckart pledges financial disclosure

"Candidates for public office must be held accountable for the funds which are funneled into their campaign sheets.

And the best way to guarantee such accountability would be to require public disclosure of all campaign contributions and contributors," said Dennis E. Eckart, candidate for the Democratic nomination for the District 18 seat in the Ohio House of Representatives.

Toward that end, Eckart said he will:

Push for legislation to revise the state laws on campaign financing.

Make a full disclosure of his own campaign contributions and expenses.

Today, largely as a consequence of the Watergate scandal, many people have become disenchanted with the election process -- not only at the federal level, but also at the state and local levels," Eckart said. "Campaign reform legislation is needed to restore public confidence in our system of government," he said.

A state law requiring office seekers to publicly disclose their sources of financial support and to detail their campaign out-

lays would be a significant step toward restoring that confidence, said Eckart, who has received the endorsement of the Ward 32 Democratic Club and also the United Auto Workers (UAW).

"As a member of the Ohio House, campaign reform legislation would be one of my top priorities," he asserted. "I think it is tragic that the current legislature has been unable to enact such a law."

Eckart said he will cooperate with the Common Cause effort to make public the contributions and expenditures of Ohio

candidates.

In the absence of a state disclosure law, Common Cause has asked candidates to voluntarily submit reports on their campaign finances. Cooperating candidates will submit lists of contributors and contributions over \$25 at three different time intervals -- 40 days and 10 days prior to the May 7 primary, and 45 days after the primary. Common Cause will make the reports available to the news media.

"I have informed the Cleveland chapter of Common Cause that I intend to cooperate with their request," Eckart said.

Also, Eckart has retained the services of Euclid Accounting Inc., 22570 Lake Shore Blvd., to monitor his campaign fund raising and expenses.

Simonelli opens campaign central

Councilman Frederick J. Simonelli's Campaign Headquarters opened Saturday. Simonelli is a Democratic candidate for the May primary Democratic nomination for State Representative in the 18th District.

The opening of the headquarters, at 21700 Lake Shore Blvd., was followed by a kick-off party at the Americana West Party Room.

Among those attending the opening were Juvenile Court Judge Angelo J. Gagliardo, Councilman-At-Large Frank J. Chukayne, Councilman-At-Large Patrick E. Talty, Ward 1 Councilman Joseph M. Farrell, Cleveland Ward 32 Club President Ronald Suster, Euclid Ward 4 Democratic Club President William Mabel,

Police charge duo in related crimes

A Euclid man, 18, and a Cleveland juvenile from Collinwood were part of two stabbing and robbery incidents occurring about two weeks apart, according to Euclid Police.

The Euclid man was to appear in Euclid Municipal court last Friday morning for a charge of aggravated robbery on Feb. 27. According to Euclid police, the man and two juveniles were cruising around Cleveland's Public Square when they picked up a 24-year-old Cleveland man after asking him if he wanted to come to a party out in Euclid.

THEY DROVE the man out to Euclid and then asked for his money at the point of a knife, police said. The man apparently panicked and jumped from the auto while the trio grabbed at his coat. The youths then cut him on the hands and stabbed him in the back while he was getting away, according to a police spokesman. He was in the Shrine Parking lot at East 221 and Euclid Ave. where he caught a ride to Richmond Heights General Hospital.

Police were then notified and picked up the suspects in a 1969 Blue and white Buick Skylark with a noisy muffler.

A court hearing was then set for last Friday for the adult. The two youths were put under custody of the county juvenile authorities.

The man suspect was let out on bond.

ON EARLY FRIDAY morning of the day he was to appear in court, the same man with two other men and two juveniles this time picked up a 19-year-old Cleveland man at Public Square, again asking the victim if he would like to go to a party in Euclid, police said.

According to police reports, the five suspects tried to rob the Cleveland man at the point of a knife in Euclid. He fought to get away slashing his four fingers on the blade of a knife, police said.

With his description of the car, a 1969 blue Buick Skylark with a loud muffler, the five suspects were apprehended within three hours.

The two youths who repeated the crime, according to police, had prior records of auto theft.

A juvenile on the second robbery attempt is a student at Euclid Senior High School. Police said all the others were high school dropouts.

Bamert was born in Ersigen, Switzerland in 1942 and began his music studies at an early age. His training included oboe, chamber music, con-

ducting and composition. He has studied in Bern, Zurich, Paris, Darmstadt and Salzburg. His conducting teachers include Louis Fourrestier, Theodor Guschlbauer and George Szell; his composition teachers include Sandor Veress, Jean Rivier and Pierre Boulez.

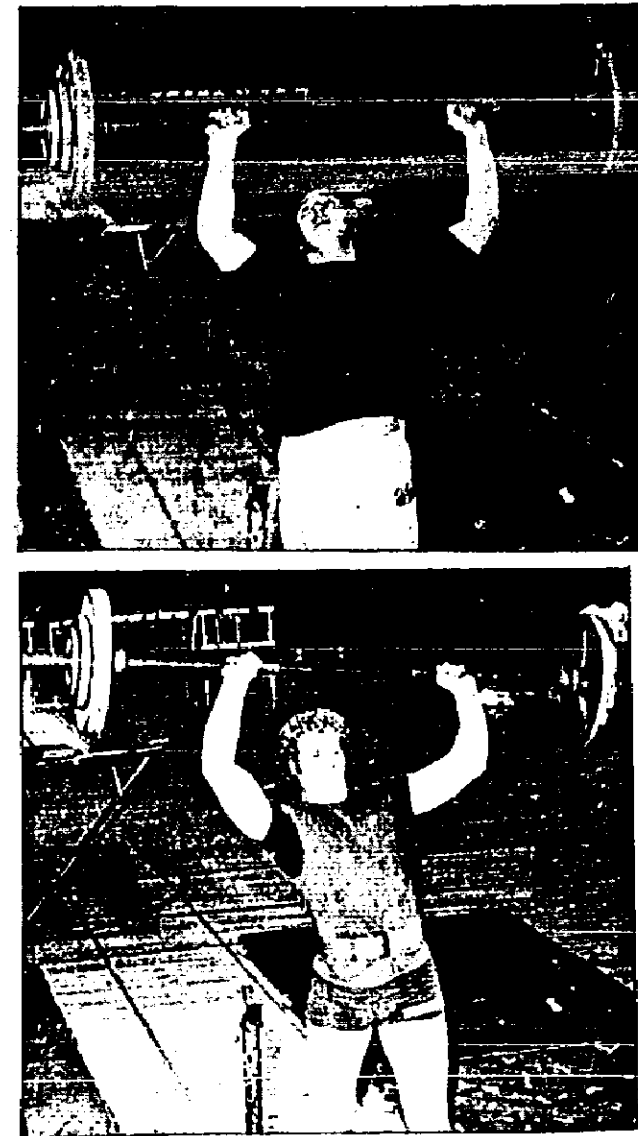
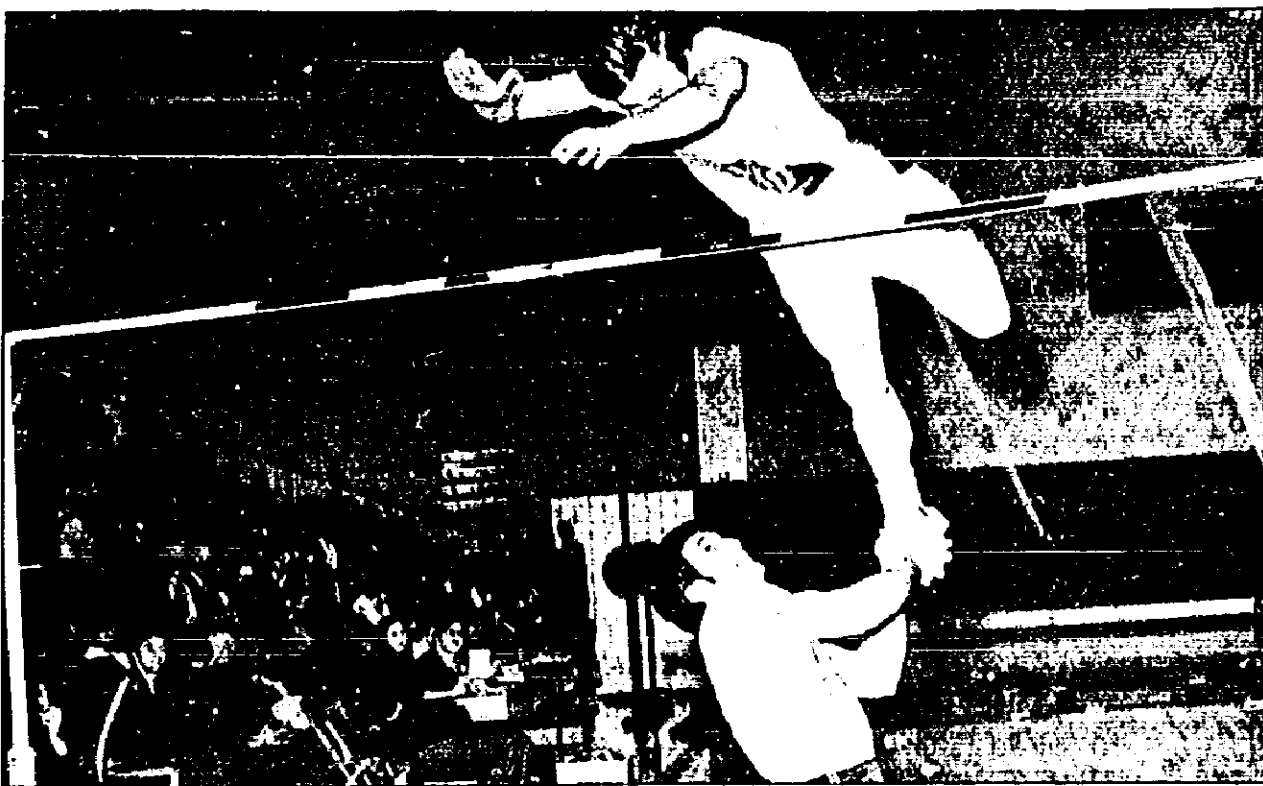
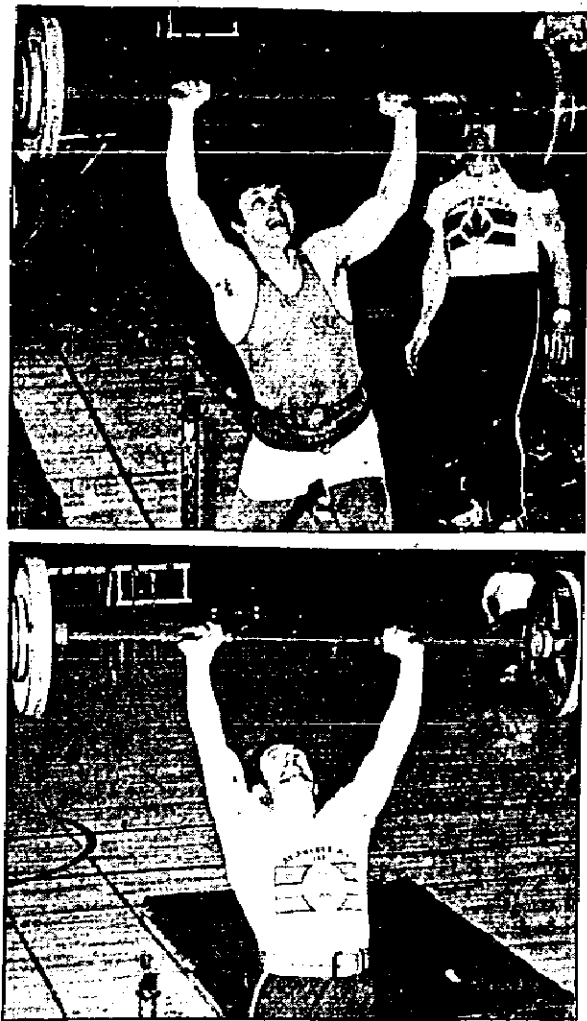

The Panthers, who are sporting one of their strongest teams ever, will rely on its overall depth and balance. Such was the case last Saturday when they hosted and easily won the L.E.L. Indoor Invitational.

EUCLID TOTALED 67 POINTS by placing in nearly every event, while Cleveland Heights and Shaw amassed 46 and 25 points respectively out of the seven-team entry.

"It was the best meet we've ever had here," said Panther coach Bob Ramlow. "Our whole philosophy is to have a balanced team. We also have some excellent individuals."

"There's a definite rivalry between us and St. Joe's because a lot of the kids know each other from grade school. It should be a good one," continued Ramlow about this week's confrontation.

ST. JOE, it would seem, would stand a better chance against Euclid if more schools were entered. The Vikings simply don't have the Panthers' super balance.

Gary Nowac, the Vike coach, is looking to the distance events. "We have a good chance in distance more so than anything else. Barry Pajcic is always tough in the 440-yard and 880-yard runs. Tom Tepley has done

well in the mile and two-mile. Kevin Ryan could help us in the mile and two-mile relay.

"The secret to Euclid's success is that they have so many kids to spread around. We're all looking forward to it because of the rivalry. I think we should do well, but winning it could be tough," said Nowac.

ST. JOE WILL HAVE to count on Sandusky to make a showing in the field events and some of the sprints.

Nowac might be a little reluctant to enter Pajcic, Tepley, and Ryan in more than two events because on Saturday they will represent St. Joe in the Ashland Invitational at Ashland College.

Euclid was devastating last weekend. They placed in all but one event, because of a disqualification, and dominated in half of the 12 categories.

SENIOR MIKE ROSE chalked up a dozen points himself by taking top honors in both the high and low 50-yard hurdles, with times of 6.5 and 6.1.

"I think he's going to be a good one," commented Ramlow. "He's developed tremendously over the years. I've never seen anything like it. And he's a good kid to work with."

The Panthers jumped out to a big lead early in the meet. Junior Karl Guentner and senior Frank Lipold placed first and second in the high jump. Todd Groudle and Rollic Skur managed second and third-place finishes with respective tosses in the shot of 52-5/8 and 50-9/16.

THE TWO-MILE RELAY team of Dennis Corrigan, Tim Perry, Alan Dole and Mark Wade proceeded to take a blue ribbon in their specialty.

Euclid went one-two in the 440-yard dash. Senior Randy Keefe tied senior Bob Hayes to contribute nine and a half points to their team's cause.

Junior Dave Lastoria placed third in the 50-yard dash, while sophomore Adrian Griffin also took third in the two-mile run.

RICK TOADDY CLOCKED a 2:03.8 time in the 880-yard run which was good for second place.

Don Ebersbacher, Al Darcy, John Behm, and Randy Keefe combined their talents to win the mile relay.

Ace Kevin Lewis was bothered all week with a cold, but he still participated in the mile and 880-yard run. In the mile, he took second and pulled out of the 880 after the second lap due to cramps.

"I started to get a cramp in the 880," said Lewis. "It was hard for me to breathe and I had a congestion in my throat. I was just sick."

Dick Mann, coach of Cleveland Heights, lauded Euclid. "They're very impressive. The track is just an excellent facility. There's no question about the whole meet being fair."

Are scholarships the answer at Joe's

The 1973-74 year thus far has been a unique experience for St. Joseph sports.

Winning seasons, win streaks, conference championships, city titles and state rankings were once accepted, if not expected, by St. Joe and its huge following.

But obviously, they are all memories now. This was the first season in 20 years, that the Vikings suffered though losing campaigns on both the gridiron and the basketball court.

THIS YEAR'S 7-12 mark in basketball was the first losing season since 1958. The 4-6 showing by the football team was only the third losing ledger in Bill Gutbrod's 23-year career at the shorefront. The last sub-par year was in 1955 when the Vikes tallied 2-6-1.

Something has happened to change St. Joe's image and one must wonder what it is.

While the Vikings won't spit any sour grapes, one coach did sum up the inadequacy when he said, "We don't have the horses."

The reasons are varied. The baby boom ceased before it could ultimately feed the present high school enrollment requirements, and the cost of a private institution has made it impos-

sible for some to attend. THE EMERGENCE of Lake Catholic and several Greater Cleveland teams into prominence has definitely steered many prospective Lake County athletes away from the doors of St. Joe.

But the big drawing card that the Vikings never had in their deck is the athletic scholarship.

For years, and especially in the mid and late 60's, St. Joe was sold and bought on reputation alone. It was considered by many to be a stepping stone to the college ranks.

However, even if O.J. Simpson was graduating from Holy Cross elementary school and shopping for a high school, St. Joe couldn't offer the kid a dime, because no previous athletic or academic achievements have any bearing. Financial assistance is based solely on a family's financial status.

SOME FEEL THIS practice is antiquated and one of the loudest dissenters is Gutbrod. The "Ve!" advocates that the student-athlete should be given some type of consideration when it comes to dishing out the monies.

"It's become so bloody competitive," Gutbrod barked, "We've maintained

ourselves through the 60's and I'm not so sure we can still do it. I'd rather not have to offer athletic scholarships, but we do have survival tendencies.

"There would be no full athletic grants," he continued, "The most we'd give would be 50 percent. And then, there are some people who wouldn't want it to begin with. The funds have to become available and then we'll consider the school and the athletic department's financial position."

St. Joe Principal Joseph Radigan and Athletic Director Bernie Guilfoyle are in accordance that academics will never take a back seat to athletics. Also, both gentlemen believe that only premise for financial aid for athletes depends totally on the ability of the boy's family to pay the \$600 tuition, which includes fees.

RADIGAN FEELS THAT the school's success in sports has an effect on enrollment and the general spirit of the student body, but to what degree, he doesn't know.

In comparison to the other schools in the Crown Conference, St. Joe and Padua are the only two schools which make no allowances for athletes.

St. Edward Athletic Director, Joe

Mackey said, "We do help the athletes out and I think all of the schools do. If St. Joe isn't doing it, I'm sure they'll start."

Mackey would not comment on whether an athlete's finances or grades have any bearing or how many athletes are aided.

TONY FERRONE, Cathedral Latin athletic director, remarked that his school does offer money to athletes, but only after their academic standing and financial situation are taken into account.

Other schools contacted, St. Ignatius, Chanel, and Lake Catholic, denied giving aid to athletes of any kind. However, James Simonis, principal of Lake Catholic, said that three football players now have their tuition covered by someone other than their family or school. These boys are not considered to be on any scholarship.

The fact remains that the offering of athletic scholarships by certain schools definitely influences their sports program in an unfair manner.

Either athletic scholarships should be disallowed entirely, or be made possible for every school. And for St. Joe, that could help.

New coach has high hopes for Spartan batmen

**CAMPING
ALL YEAR ROUND

RV'S HAVE YEAR-ROUND USES

We live in a house in which the second-floor bedrooms turn into a furnace during an exceptionally severe heat wave in the summer. It's virtually impossible to sleep there without the air conditioners turned at least on low. A friend asked me the other day what we'd do in the event the energy crisis curtails, or even eliminates completely, the home use of air conditioners. "Sleep out there," I replied, pointing to the camper in the backyard.

I went on to explain that we frequently do that anyhow in the summertime since none of us enjoys the hum of air conditioners turned up high.

Many RV owners think their units are only for camping when, in fact, they can be used year-round for a multitude of reasons without even rolling them out of the driveway. And they're second-home insurance during times of weather-related emergencies, power outages and brownouts.

An RV with its own energy system powering such things as a heater, stove, lights, hot water system, refrigerator and perhaps even a generator can be a lifesaver in an emergency situation. I even have a truck camper friend who puts his citizens band radio into use if telephone service is interrupted.

Even if the LP gas supply in your RV is exhausted, portable gasoline or propane appliances can be used for cooking, lighting and even a certain amount of heat - providing adequate ventilation is provided.

But it doesn't have to be an emergency for you to get added use out of your RV. It can also be:

- An overflow extra bedroom when house guests arrive.
- The summerhouse you never quite got around to building.
- Slumber party headquarters for the kids.
- A children's playhouse-on-wheels.
- A hospitality house for all kinds of outdoor entertaining.
- A weekend office for Dad to catch up on paperwork.
- An office for your yard or garage sale.
- A cozy sitting for a cocktail party, one that you don't have to clean up until the next day.
- The kitchen for a backyard cookout.
- And on the road, it can also be:
 - A dressing room for swimming changes at state park pools or beaches.
 - A motel room at a state fair or at a camping show.
 - A chockwagon at club or church picnics.

The list is endless - I'm sure you can think of countless more. And remember, every new use you discover for your RV increases the value of your original investment. Before the energy crisis is over, I'm sure we'll all be finding new ways to use our RVs.

One added bonus: Keeping your RV in shape for year-round use cuts preparation time for your next camping trip. Your gear is always loaded and ready to go.

SURPRISE - The Coleman Company's Camping Trailer Division decided to find out recently exactly how much a towed trailer increases gasoline consumption. Using a variety of vehicles in recent road tests, they drove them on 100-mile round trips at 50 mph - first without a trailer, then with one in tow.

Results in each case indicated that towing took less than one additional gallon of gas for the entire 100 miles. Granted, these were low profile camping trailers with little wind drag, but the tests proved a point.

Except for the monster travel trailers, a reasonably light towed trailer requires less gas on the open road than many people think.

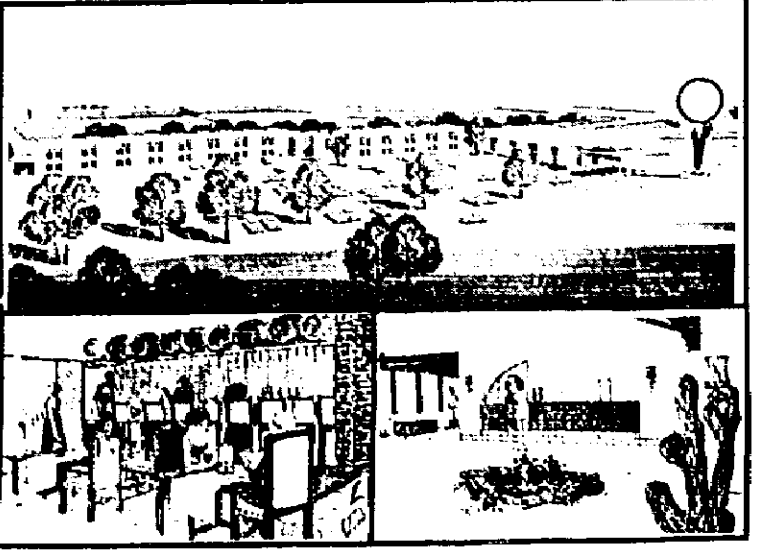

Bolton finances

Charles P. Bolton (R-Mentor) today released his financial disclosure statement as filed with the Senate Ethics Committee in accordance with Am. H. B. No. 55 which became effective Jan. 1.

Bolton is currently filling out the unexpired term in the 31st Senatorial District which includes portions of Lake, Cuyahoga and Geauga Counties and is seeking election in November. All candidates for election to the State Senate are required to file this financial disclosure statement by March 1st with the Senate Legislative Ethics Committee.

Bolton said, "Although I do not believe financial disclosures should be the price to pay to enter politics, I willingly released my income figures, although it is not required by the Senate Ethics Committee. My family is well known for their generosity and public involvement. I am naturally grateful for my financial status and the opportunity it affords for independent judgment in the Senate. However, my income will surely show that I am no millionaire

and that in order to finance my campaign this year I will have to rely, as I said I would, on widespread support."

The Senator's income in 1972 was \$36,756 and his income in 1973 was \$34,912 derived from his salary as an investment banker with W. E. Hutton Co. in New York and from income received from an irrevocable trust established by his grandmother in 1955.

Bolton's financial disclosure statement indicates that he is the income beneficiary only of this trust, over which he has no discretion or control and to which he has made no transfers of property.

Bolton's statement also indicates that he is currently living at his family home at 8021 S. Center Street in Mentor but intends to move to a rented house at 8510 Hart Road on the border of Mentor and Kirtland Hills upon the sale on May 1st of his New York house, which is currently under lease.

Bolton is also the director of two family-owned companies which own two buildings in the Cleveland area in which he has no financial interest.

Song Festival seeks talent

Aspiring songwriters in every city and hamlet in the United States now have an open chance to win instant fame and fortune in the form of a 1974 American Song Festival.

Sponsorship of the nation's first international music competition has been announced by Sterling Recreation Organization, a radio station, movie theater and recreation center conglomerate headquartered in Seattle.

ACCORDING TO Malcolm C. Klein, Sterling vice president and festival president, the newly-founded event comprises a multifaceted music talent hunt in which winners will receive a total of \$128,000 in cash prizes and have their songs sung by leading recording artists.

Different from established festivals in Italy, Lebanon and Brazil, entries are being accepted from amateur composers as well as professionals.

Contestants may seek recognition and commercial success in one or more of six music categories: (1) rock, (2) pop - middle of the road, (3) soul

- rhythm - blues - jazz, (4) folk, (5) country - western and (6) gospel - religious.

ENTRIES ON recorded cassettes will be screened by a select panel of songwriting experts, Klein said. Three semifinalists in each category in separate amateur and professional divisions will eventually be nominated.

The 36 semifinalists will each receive \$500 and an expense-paid trip to Saratoga Springs, N.Y., where final judging will be held Labor Day weekend at the Saratoga Performing Arts Center.

Competing songs will be performed in a national television special, Klein said.

TWELVE VICTORIOUS composers in the two divisions will each be awarded \$5,000. An additional \$25,000 will go to the overall amateur winner and overall professional winner. Writer of the song judged best of festival will also be given a concert grand piano.

Contestants may enter any number of songs in any category by an April 15 deadline. Cost of entry is \$10.85 per song.

Name, address and money by check or money order should be sent to American Song Festival, Post Office Box 57, Hollywood, California 90028.

BY RETURN MAIL, contestants will receive an official entry blank, a cassette for recording an entered song and a festival-published Songwriter's Handbook containing information on marketing music.

The cassette obviates any requirement to be able to write, read or sing music, Klein said. He added that entered songs will remain the sole property of contestants.

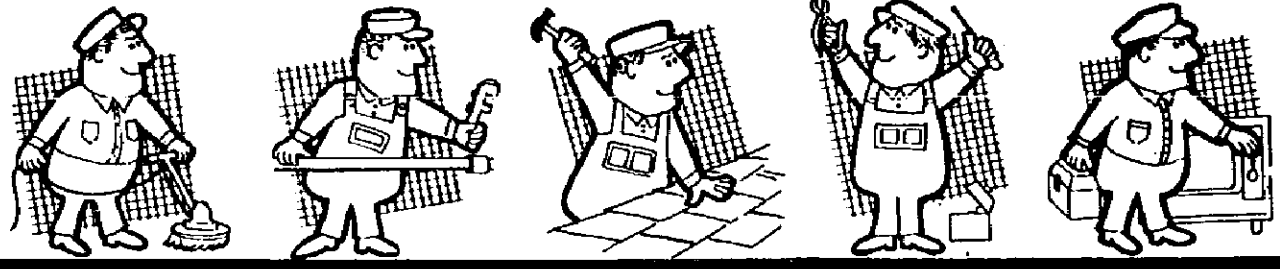

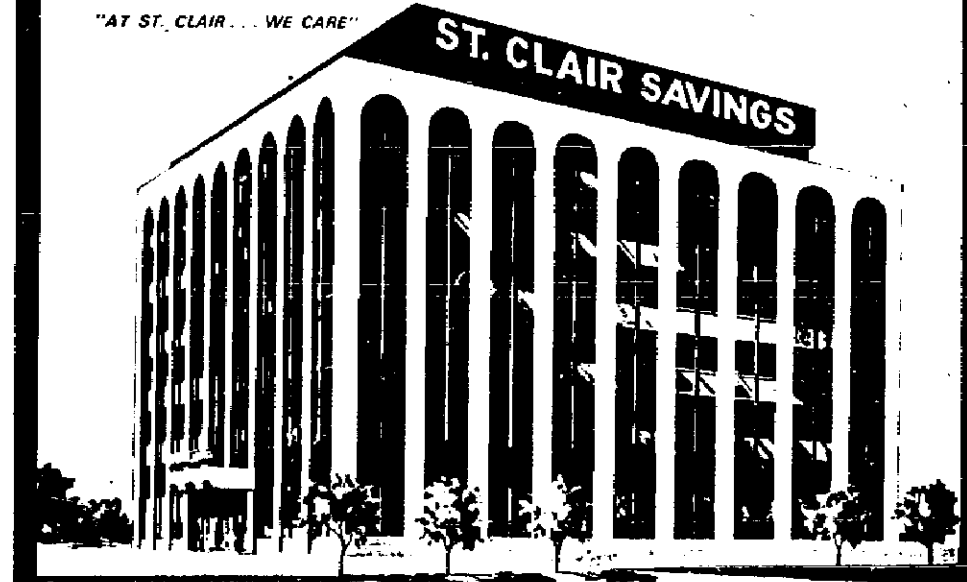
