Family, gas attendant

Narcotic arrests

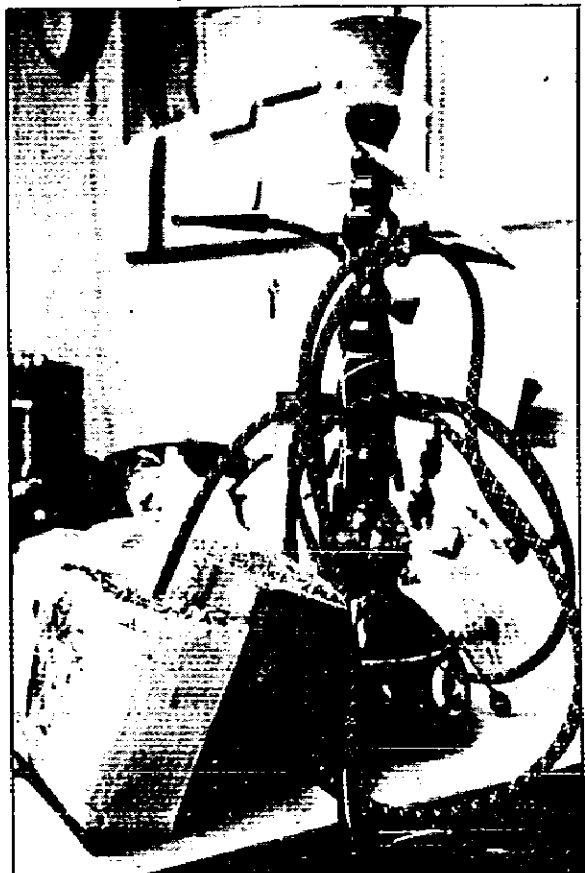

Euclid police continued its crackdown on narcotics last week with two arrests, a night station attendant and four of five members of a Euclid family.

Since the reorganization of the Euclid police May 1, the beefed up narcotics squad under Detective Robert Payne has made more than 30 arrests, which is more than were made in the previous whole year.

ON JULY 5 a team of Euclid police, arrested Bruce Vehar, 20, at a gas station at East 242 and Lake Shore Boulevard for the alleged sale of marijuana. He was also charged with possession. The police had the station under surveillance for about one week before they made the arrest.

Vehar who lives at 19600 Locherie Ave. is out after a \$2,500 bail was set. He will appear in Euclid Municipal Court on July 20th.

ACCORDING to police he has been selling marijuana to young kids in the neighborhood.

On Friday night the police also began their surveillance on the Fox family who reside at 26471 Mallard Ave. The house had been under some observation for two weeks, but was put under full time observation for two days leading to the arrest.

"We counted at least 40 persons per day trapping into the house and most of them were between the ages of 13 and 25," said Detective Payne. On early Monday morning (1 a.m.) eight police surrounded the house.

"WE POUNDED on the door three minutes but nobody opened it. We could hear people scuffling around in the house," said Payne.

Payne then, with the added help of detective Ernie Lafelica, kicked the door down, entered the house and made the arrest. No resistance was made by the family.

Arrested were Robert Fox, 40, and his wife Evelyn, 35, and a son Terry, 20, and a daughter, Cindy 18. The parents were both cited for the alleged possession of marijuana (a misdemeanor); the son Terry was cited for the possible possession of marijuana and the sale of marijuana. Daughter Cindy was arrested for allegedly possessing marijuana and barbituates.

A YOUNGER SON, age 12, was not arrested. He was taken in by neighbors after the arrest of his family.

A \$500 bail has been set for the parents, \$1,000 for Cindy and \$2,000 for the son. All are expected to post the bond and be out of jail awaiting court appearance for pleas on July 27. After obtaining a search warrant the police also confiscated several half kilos of marijuana and several smoking devices which included a large oriental water pipe with four smoking outlets. The marijuana was considered by the police to be of average or poor quality. It had been packed in waterproof cellophane packages. Other smaller bags of about one ounce a piece were also taken. An ounce of marijuana is presently costing about \$20 in the Euclid area.

A QUANTITY OF sopors were also taken. This is the term given to methaqualone, which is a depressant. These are presently selling for about \$10 per 100 pills.

The Foxes are due to appear in Euclid Municipal Court on July 27. Sale of marijuana is a felony and punishable on the first offense by a ten to 20 year prison sentence.

Police attribute the growing number of arrests to the teamwork between the tactical, patrol and detective bureaus.

"The farther we get into all these arrests the more doors that open for us," said Payne. He added that more arrests can be expected in the future from the narcotics squad.

Simonelli sets sights for Ward 4 re-election

Councilman Frederick J. Simonelli (Ward 4) has announced his intention to run for re-election this fall. Simonelli was elected with a landslide total of 61 percent of the vote in 1971, garnering one of the highest winning percentages by a successful ward candidate in the city's history.

SIMONELLI, AN ACTIVE and outspoken Councilman, has fought for several major pieces of legislation, such as his Apartment Moratorium Ordinance and Ethics Bill. As Chairman of Council's Environment Committee Simonelli has been the

leading proponent of a recycling program for Euclid and has fought to preserve Euclid's remaining Park land. Simonelli has also been the leading advocate on Council for the creation of an Industrial Commission to attract and keep jobs in Euclid.

He also sponsored Euclid's Halloween Safety Ordinance, establishing the strictest punishments for the distribution of adulterated food-stuffs to children in the county. Simonelli has been active in consumer protection and product safety, organizing a citizen's task force to oversee the implementation of the Federal Child Safety Act in Euclid.

IN WARD 4, SIMONELLI has initiated a regular newsletter and makes complete seasonal distributions of it to Ward 4 residents. Simonelli includes a questionnaire with each newsletter to give the people of Ward 4 an opportunity to make their opinions and desires known to him.

Simonelli has fought intensely for needed repairs and improved services in Ward 4. The rebuilding of Glenridge Road, and major sewer construction in the Chardon Road area, the Caswell-Treadwell homes area, the E. 219th E. 221st area, and North Street, have been among the

programs Councilman Simonelli has been urging the city to undertake.

"When I was elected to Council in 1971 I told the people of Ward 4 that I'd give every effort to representing their interests," Simonelli said.

'Conflict of reasoning'-Malone

Salaries, HB 629 are albatross to schools

Dick Malone, president of the Euclid Teachers Association (ETA), outlined his negotiation procedures on salaries for the upcoming months with the Euclid school administration. "We are going to fight," he said determinedly after hearing at the regular school board meeting Monday the confirmation from the administration that the salaries increases he will be seeking had not been included in the budget for 1974.

"How can I negotiate if

there is no money in the budget to negotiate with," he queried.

MALONE ADDED the percent of money which is spent on the teaching salaries has declined from 61 to 57.4 percent according to statistics supplied to him by the Ohio Education Association.

"I find this is a conflict in the reasoning of the budget," said Malone.

Clerk-treasurer Lowell Davis confirmed his statement and then clarified that the budget is just a vehicle for raising money for the year while

the appropriations are the means of spending it. The board also clarified that it will have to make cuts for the upcoming year to offset the expected \$648,000 deficit for the year 1974.

Davis also intoned further bad news for the board when he warned of the impending doom of House Bill No. 629 which will decrease the low point of the personal property tax to 35 percent. The bill is still in the Ways and Means Committee of the house, but if it comes out on the floor, Davis contends it will have a good chance of

passing because of the 52 sponsors of the bill.

"JUST THE sponsors of the bill are enough to insure its passage," added Davis.

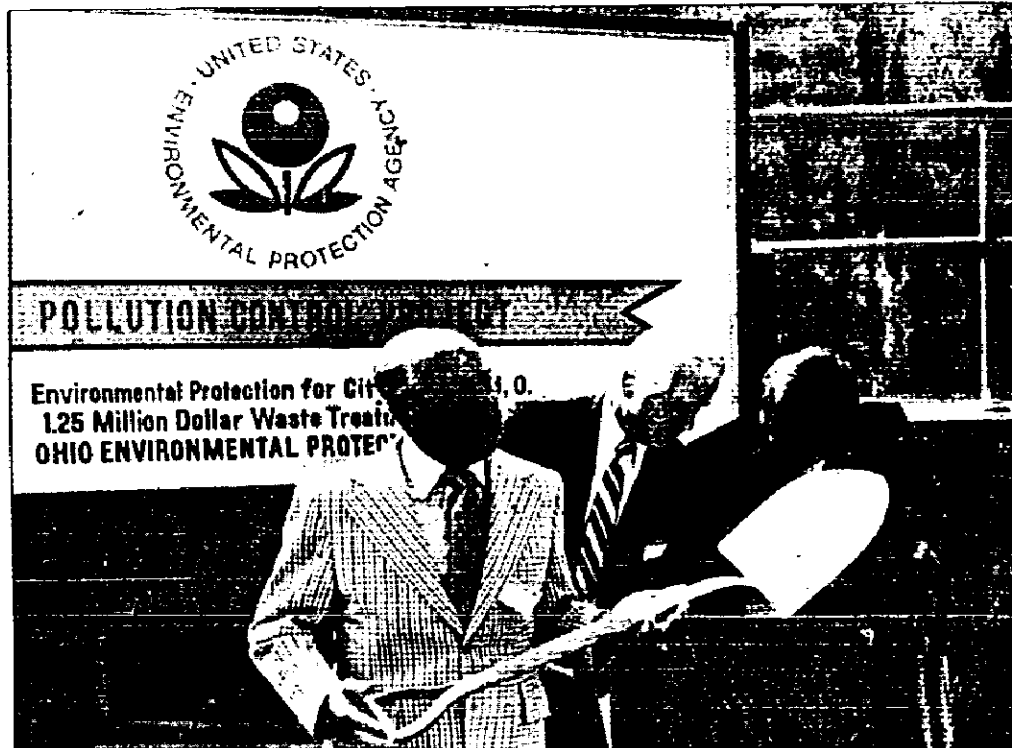
The personal property tax used to be 70 percent. After the passage of House Bill 475 the tax is in the process of being lowered to 50 percent in four percent increments. Presently the tax rates is at 62 percent. House Bill 629 if passed is geared to take effect immediately and thus will lose the school district about \$1,200,000 or three (SEE PAGE 9)

300 want signatures removed

Euclid Finance Director Arthur Davis Tuesday morning said he had received in excess of 300 postcards from persons asking that their names be removed from a referendum petition for repeal of ordinance No. 123-1973 which rezoned the Chase, Brass and Copper Co.

The cards were received as a result of a campaign by the Jacobs, Visconti and Jacobs Co., which included the postcards in letters to about 3200 of the 4,064 persons who signed the petitions.

"IT'S TOTALLY IMPOSSIBLE to give all residents of Euclid the comprehensive amount of information we gave to city officials who voted to allow the rezoning," Edward Crane, legal counsel for the Jacobs-Visconti group said. "That's why we prefer not to have an election." (SEE PAGE 9)

Euclid tops in pollution control

Euclid is three years ahead of the rest of the nation in pollution control, according to Cheryl Lane, chief chemist at the city's waste water treatment plant.

That was the gist of a report submitted to Mayor Harry Knuth by Mrs. Lane after she attended the National Association of Manufacturers' "Industry and

Government Teleconference on Pollution" held in Cleveland last month.

IT WAS REPORTED at the conference that local governments would soon require industries to map out their sewage systems, report their discharges monthly and list their accessible sampling manholes. Mrs. Lane said the three requirements were already mandatory in Euclid.

"We have required pre-treatment facilities to be installed for three years now and have a very stringent list of contaminants for discharges," Mrs. Lane said. "Euclid industrialists present at the meeting were pleased that their pre-treatment facilities were already installed, and that they were submitting continual monthly reports and had already taken care of the map and manhole matters.

Roemisch may file suit on council's Chase vote

Milton Roemisch, an attorney, is expected to file a suit against the Euclid city Council for the rezoning vote on the Chase Brass Property by the end of this week.

Roemisch, who claims he has land investments of over half a million dollars in Euclid, says the council did not follow the guidelines of the Master Plan of Euclid when it rezoned the land from industrial to commercial last month.

The property was rezoned for the expected building of a shopping mall to be developed by Jacobs, Visconti and Jacobs.

Roemisch states he would like to see the land kept as industrial property.

"The police would be busy. Just look what has happened at Severance Center in Cleveland Heights," said Roemisch.

He also added that the traffic is bad enough on Babbitt Rd. without adding more to the area already.

"Why didn't they take the land across the street which was already zoned for commercial?" queried Roemisch.

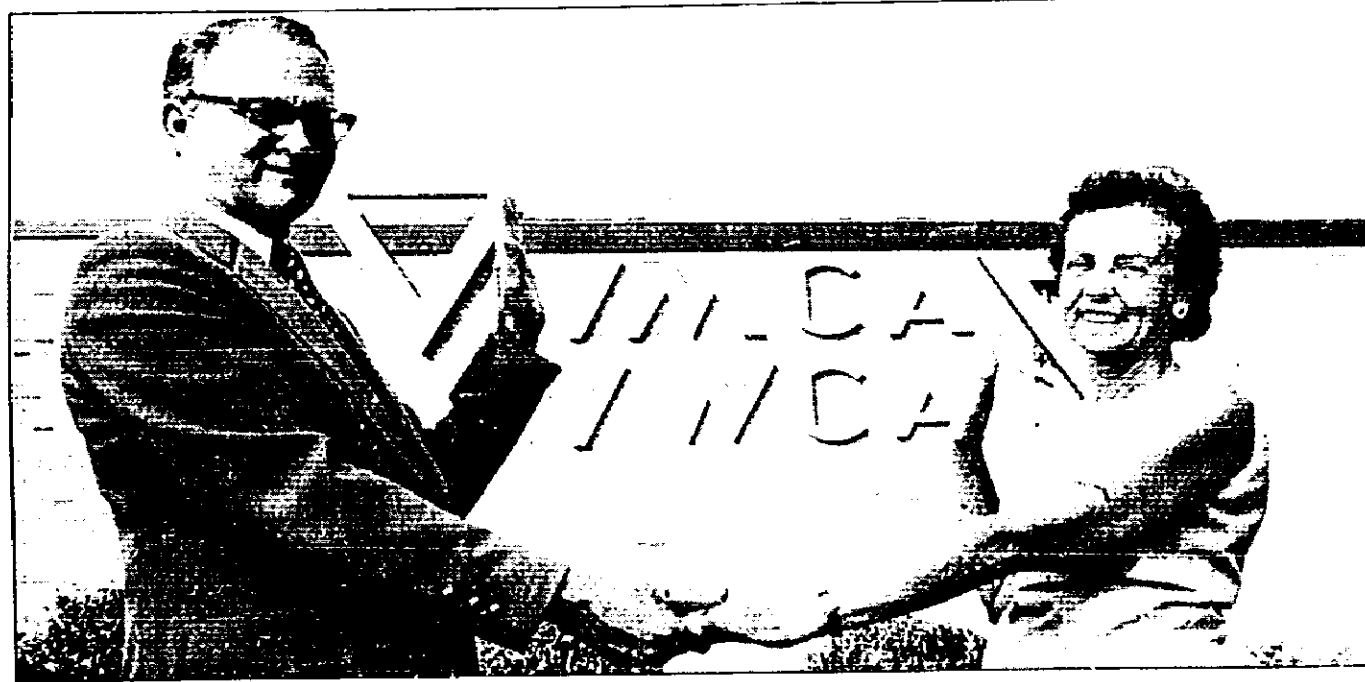
The land he referred to is adjacent to the Addressograph company on Babbitt Rd.

Public administration program new at Dyke

The curriculum is comprised of 63 semester hours of general education, 32 semester hours in public administration, 33 semester hours of major courses and free electives.

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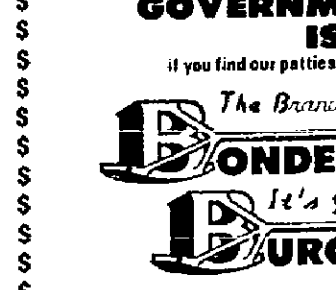

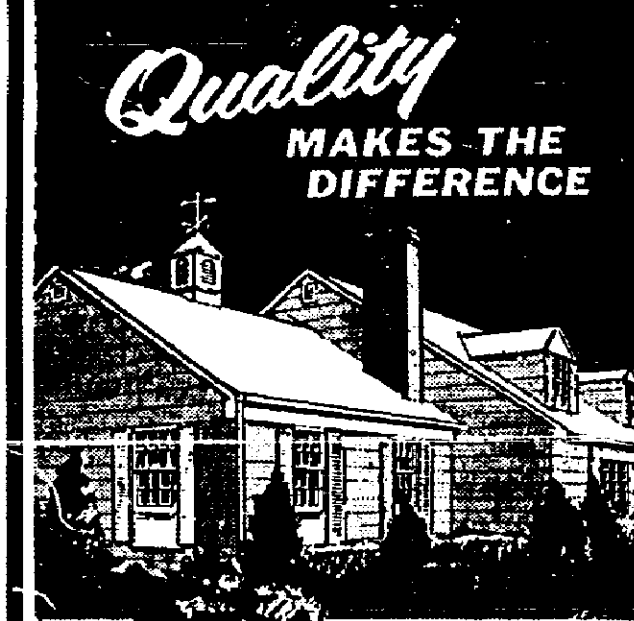
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Craig A. Boehlke is ordained as minister

SUSAN DUFF'S CALORIE COUNTDOWN

During the summer season, most people seem to find themselves drinking a lot more beverages than usual. Hot days make us thirstier, and there is simply a great deal more occasion to sit down and cool off with a tall icy refresher. Now, if we drank nothing but cold water, of course, our figures would never show the difference, but, variety being the spice of life, the most conscientious dieters might often find themselves tempted to indulge in something more flavorful like a nice cold soda or beer. Chilled beverages don't have to be so dangerous for determined reducers, however, and the following calorie counts might help you to keep your summertime coolers under control.

Carbonated beverages seem to be the most ubiquitous and among the most irresistible of the summer cool-off drinks. If you like the no-cal kind, you're in luck—several brands contain only 1 or 2 calories per 12-ounce can, a fact which is proudly and prominently proclaimed on the label. But, if you find nothing so satisfying as a regular old-fashioned bottle or can of soda pop, the following calorie counts can help you select from among them. Ginger ale is the least caloric of all 115 calories per 12 fluid ounces; plain carbonated soda water is, surprisingly, exactly the same as ginger ale. (I'd always thought you could drink it like water without a thought to tabulating calories. Not so.) Cola-type beverages are 145 calories per 12-ounce glass and root beer is a little more at 150 calories a glassful. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the fruit-flavored sodas are the highest of all in caloric content: about 170 calories per 12 fluid ounces of grape, orange, strawberry, or whatever, soda. The exception from among the fruity sodas is the clear, lemon-lime soda (known from advertising as the un-cola) which features only 146 calories per 12-ounce serving.

A can of ice cold beer (usually 12 ounces) counts in at a consistent 150 calories no matter what you do. There are, however, one or two lower calorie brands of beer on the market and you might want to give them a taste if you really love your summer beer.

Fruit and fruit-flavored, non-carbonated drinks also proliferate during the warm months and you may be surprised to discover that most of them contain even more calories than soda. Canned grapeade, for example, has 192 calories per 12-ounce glass. The usual orangeade has about 186 calories in 12 fluid ounces. That popular red fruit punch, canned or frozen, is a bit better adding up to 160 calories per 12 ounces, and commercially prepared lemonade is also somewhat lower than the other: for 12 ounces, there are 168 calories in the dairy-pack container or bottle, and 147 calories in the frozen variety. Pink lemonade adds little flavor to the regular kind and it adds a substantial number of calories. Add a little juice from the maraschino cherry jar if you really prefer it pink. Better still, if you really like lemonade, make your own. It's much cheaper and invariably less caloric. Mix lemon juice squeezed from a fresh lemon has 60 calories (if you use the prepared, bottled lemon juice, count 80 calories per cup), and that sugar has 60 calories per tablespoon. If you use artificial sweeteners in preparing lemonade, the calorie count will dip down still more. Make a single glass of low-cal lemonade for yourself by mixing one-third cup freshly squeezed lemon juice (20 calories), one teaspoon sugar (32 calories) and two-thirds cup water. Load it up with ice and enjoy a tangy, refreshing 52-calorie summer cooler.

The Euclid Jaycees were named a winner of the Clarence H. Howard Memorial award, which is presented annually to the top 25 chapters in the nation.

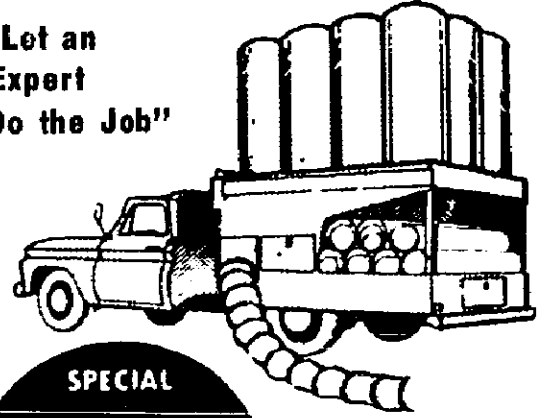

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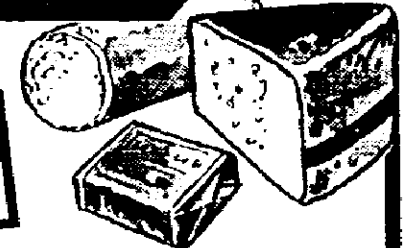

On stolen bicycles

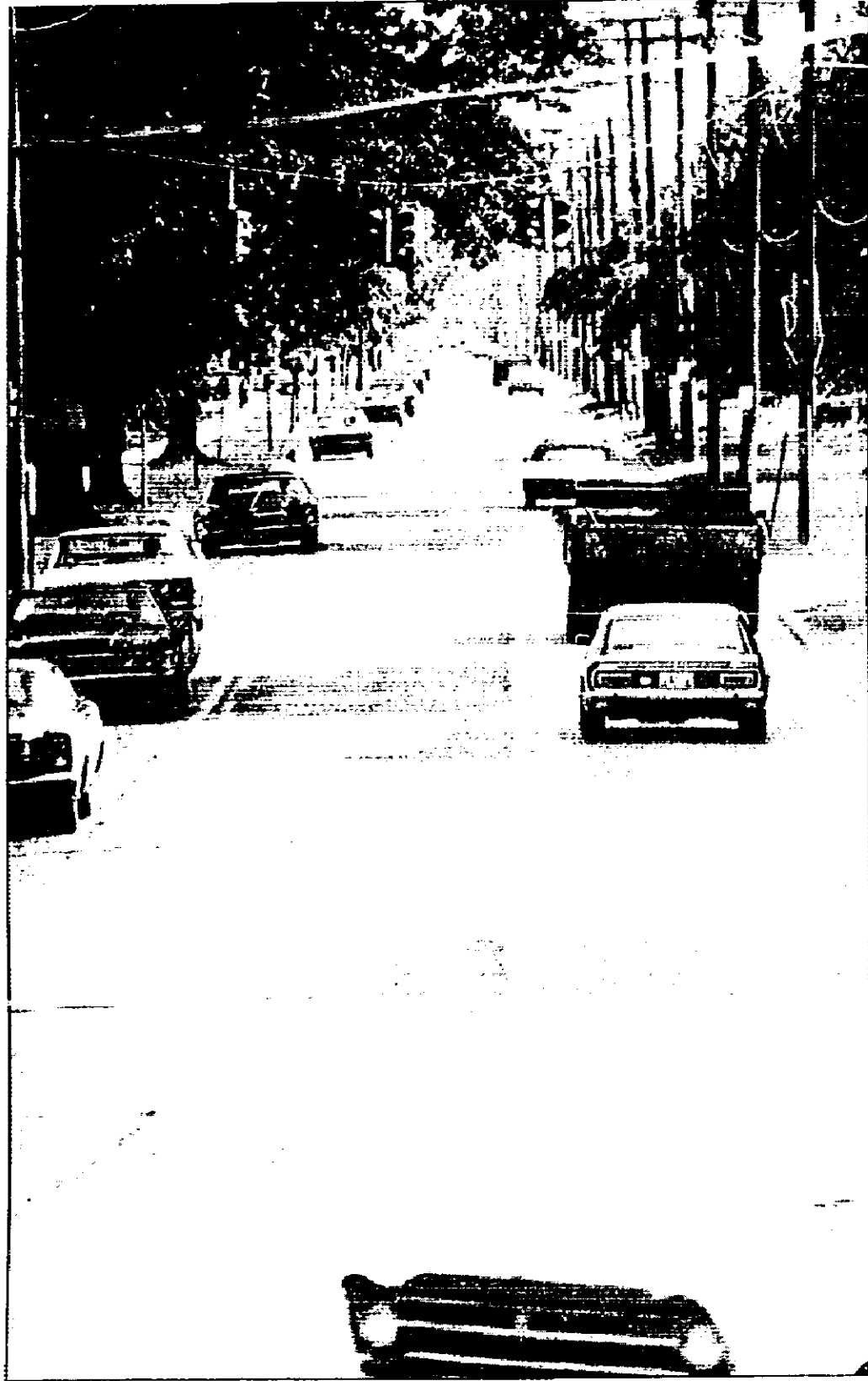

Bike thefts on rise

It's July, so it's only natural that firecrackers and bicycle thefts have again come to the forefront of police concern.

Forty was the magic number in both instances as Euclid police received 40 complaints about firecracker explosions on July 4th and 40 cases of bike theft in the entire month of June. Both numbers are rising.

POLICE ESTIMATE that they received over 100 complaints concerning youths celebrating Independence Day with various types of explosives between last Wednesday's holiday and early Tuesday, July 10th.

Fortunately, no serious accidents have been reported as a result of the annual holocaust.

As far as the bike burglaries are concerned, police warned that unless the bikes are registered there is little chance for recovery.

THE PURCHASE OF A simple 25 cent license, available in the basement of City Hall, is all it takes to lessen the risk of theft, but it seems not too many youngsters are taking advantage of it.

"Even if the thief disposes of the license plate, we can still trace the serial number," a police spokesman said. "Otherwise there's no way for us to check it."

In between firecrackers, bike thefts, the usual traffic violations and drug arrests (see story on page one), police were also kept busy investigating a string of burglaries along Euclid Ave. this week.

THE FIRST BREAK-IN was reported at Niagra Cyclo Massage, 25451 Euclid

Ave., at 9:30 a.m. Monday. Three doors and a filing cabinet were damaged as a result of jimmying, and \$100 was stolen. The theft occurred between 3:30 p.m. Saturday and the time of the report.

Moments later police were called to investigate a break-in at a doctor's office at 25445 Euclid.

AGAIN, DOORS WERE damaged during the robbery attempt and desk drawers were ransacked. Because the doctor is on vacation, however, it is not known whether any medicines were taken, nor was it determined when the incident occurred.

At 10 a.m. Monday, another break-in was reported at Trattner Realty, also located at 25445 Euclid. Drawers, closets and storage spaces were rifled, but nothing was reported stolen.

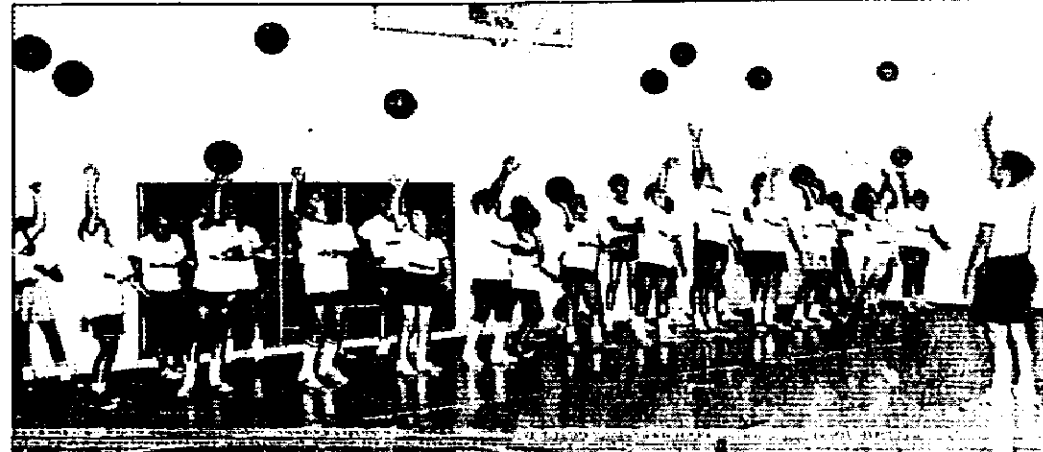
The realty office had been closed between 5:30 p.m. Saturday and the time of the report.

Voinovich ups efforts on delinquent taxes

A crash program launched six months ago by County Auditor George V. Voinovich, to collect delinquent property taxes is showing "Positive results," according to the County Auditor.

Almost \$4 million has been slashed from the \$26 million delinquent list since January.

Voinovich credits what he terms a "Prodding program" as the chief factor in shrinking the delinquency list.

"We are pushing delinquent taxpayers to clear up taxes and penalties," Voinovich said. "In some cases, we manage to collect the overdue taxes in single payments. When this is not possible, we set up installment payments to wipe out the delinquencies."

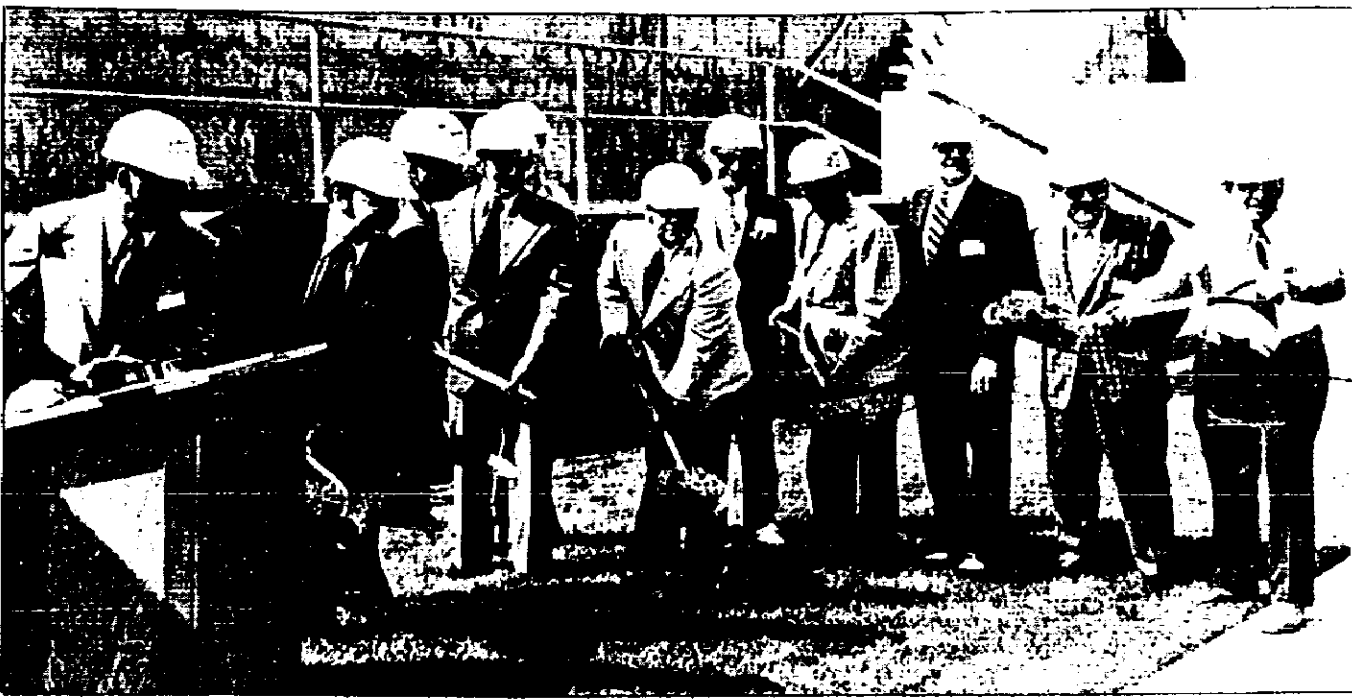
Foreclosure sales are initiated as a last resort. Voinovich said. "In many of these cases the delinquent parcels are considered sub-marginal by the owners and not worth the taxes due," he said.

Voinovich praised the County Treasurer's office and the County Prosecutor's office for much of the results in cutting the delinquency list.

"COUNTY PROSECUTOR John T. Corrigan is giving outstanding attention to those parcels that we certify ready for foreclosure," Voinovich said. "In addition, County Treasurer Frank Brennan has developed a tax bill that now lumps current taxes and delinquent taxes in the total. This prevents a taxpayer from merely paying the current tax and letting the delinquent tax ride."

But, no matter how hard they try, County officials can't squeeze any overdue taxes out of the County's leading delinquent taxpayer. That's the bankrupt Penn Central Railroad that owes more than \$5 million, dating back to 1970, all of which has been put into a deep freeze by federal court order. "If we could collect from Penn Central, we would reduce our real property delinquency to about \$17 million, or about 5 percent of the County's total real property tax duplicate," Voinovich said. "As it stands now, our delinquency factor is about 6 percent of the tax duplicate."

The delinquent tax roll is considered a fairly accurate barometer on the area's economic situation. During the depression years of the mid-1930's about 50 percent of real property taxes went uncollected.

CAMPING ALL YEAR ROUND

BY FORD BOTHWELL

USE PROPER FIRE EXTINGUISHER

Q.—What type of fire extinguisher should I carry in my trailer?

A.—If you're rigged for electricity, either a dry chemical or carbon dioxide (CO₂) type. Both will handle fires fueled by flammable liquids (gasoline, oil, grease), as well as electrical fires. The dry chemical powder smothers the fire and forms a film that prevents reflash. The CO₂ smothers the fire with a cloudy gas that displaces air.

Foam extinguishers, such as the small, pressurized bottles sold at campgrounds and camping stores, will deal with flammable fires but not electrical ones. So if your trailer uses electricity, obviously the first two are your best bet.

Remember to keep a check on your extinguisher's pressure. Most have a dial gauge with a needle indicating its operating level. The small foam bottles have a replacement date stamped on them.

Incidentally, it's the law in some states that trailers must carry approved fire extinguishers and road flares for night use (and red flags for daytime) in the event of a breakdown. It's your safety that's involved, so do it no matter what state you're passing through.

TIPS THAT WORK: Always looking for a fresh mantle when the old one on your lantern breaks? (You usually discover this late at night when you pull into a dark campsite, need the light and wonder where you packed the mantles.) Tape a couple of spares on the bottom or side of your lantern. Always carry a couple more spares in the glove compartment of your car for emergency use.

—Put crumpled newspaper in the dead air spaces in your ice chest. It'll make your ice last longer. Newspaper is a great insulator.

—Install clamp-on circular, convex mirrors below the flat front fender mirrors you use when pulling a trailer. They'll increase your field of vision tremendously. Tractor trailers use such dual mirrors—and for the same reason.

—A down sleeping bag should be laid flat and fluffed up by hand an hour before bedding down to improve its insulation qualities. When possible, it should be hung when not in use, instead of rolled up, to prevent lumping and to let air circulate.

—Want to sit up and read while others go to sleep? Wrap a piece of aluminum foil around the globe of your lantern, leaving enough of a slit to give you the light you need. It's fireproof.

—Stuck in the wilds and out of soap? Salt, dry paper towels and elbow grease will clean the toughest of cooking pans. And if you can't get the black off the bottoms of pans that have been over an open fire, next time coat the undersides with a moistened soap bar before you cook. The black will wipe right off afterwards.

—To prevent slipping on your trailer step, particularly when it's raining, put down some nonskid adhesive strips, the kind used on boat decks, in bathtubs, etc.

—Wool or heavy pile orlon socks are best for hiking because they cushion the feet, absorb perspiration and lessen friction between the foot and shoe, the major cause of blisters. Veteran hikers change their socks once or twice a day due to perspiration and worry about their selection of socks as much as they do their hiking shoes.

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McCormack wants investigation of Ohio petroleum producers

State Representative Tim McCormack, D-18, Euclid, called upon Ohio Attorney General William Brown to initiate prompt action to determine whether Ohio anti-trust laws have been violated by the major Ohio petroleum producers and retailers.

In a letter Brown McCormack stated, "There appears to be sufficient evidence resulting from the petroleum industry's reaction to the so called energy crisis which I believe warrants a thorough investigation by your office," stated McCormack.

"OHIO HAS had anti-trust legislation in effect for a number of years but it is seldom used to protect the individual consumer. I believe this apparent hoax on the part of several monopolistic oil companies should be subject to immediate anti-trust inquiry," McCormack said.

Citing soaring fixed retail gasoline prices, reduced supply to individual customers and independent operators, which is forcing many operators to reduce their hours and subsequently forcing them out of business to reduce competition, and other actions of the major producers of oil in concert with each other, McCormack contends that sufficient evidence exists to believe anti-trust violations have occurred.

"Anti-trust action is proper when two or more people act to restrict trade, limit or reduce production, increase or reduce the price of merchandise, prevent competition in the making, sale, or purchase of goods; or act to control prices by price fixing whereby the price charged to the public or consumer is controlled and fixed by producers. I believe a number of these conditions exist now and should be investigated," McCormack stated.

"I FIRMLY believe that action on the part of the Attorney General's office and the State of Ohio is essential at this time to protect the public against being abused by the petroleum giants," McCormack concluded.

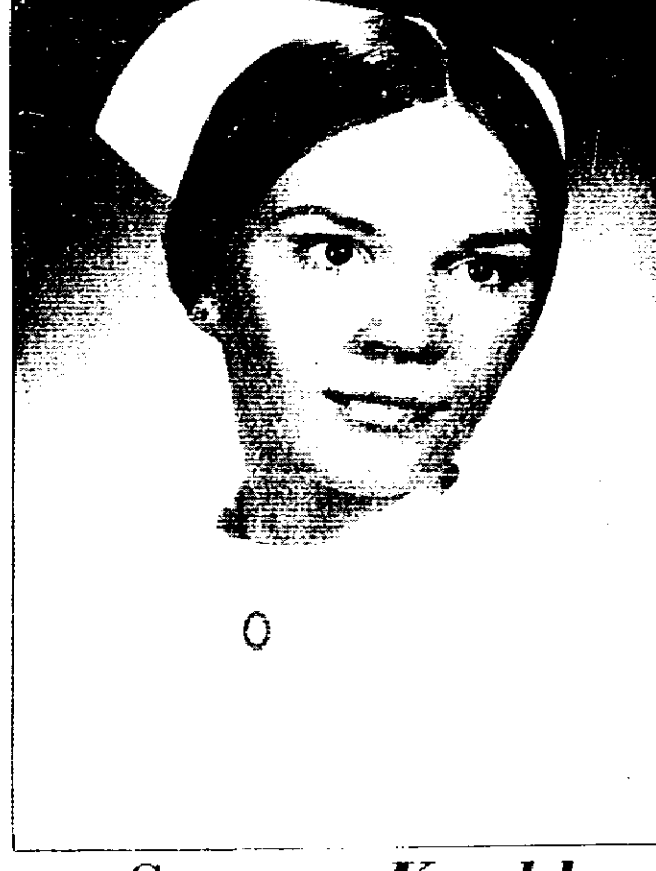

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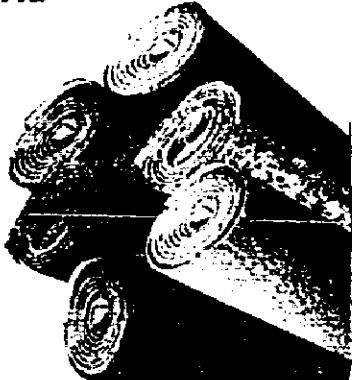

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Sounds great, doesn't it. A lot of people have thought so, because last year some 9,000 land development companies sold about 650,000 lots for close to six billion dollars. Average cost of a quarter-acre: \$7,300.

But listen—an estimated half of all people who rush to grab such a bargain have lost their investment because they can't use the land. Their Golden Acre worthless. In short, many land development companies are practicing outright fraud. The federal government has received thousands of complaints, and would receive more if the victims knew where and how to go help.

In terms of dollars, the land boom may be the biggest con game now going on in the United States. Here's how it works. A land development company buys huge tracts of raw, undeveloped land. The company chops the acreage into plots, ranging from an acre to miserable one-seventh acre. The plots are then offered for sale—at up to 20 times what the company paid.

Now starts the high-powered promotion: big ads in newspapers, fancy brochures in full color, promotion dinners for prospective customers at which salesmen (often called "land consultants") bear down on the hard sell.

They overwhelm the prospective buyer with facts and figures. Beautiful country. Plenty of elbow room. The land is appreciating the value 15-20 per cent a year even if you don't want to build, buy it for an investment. The scientifically planned community will have everything for gracious living—schools, paved roads, stores, golf course, boating. Beautiful. And small monthly payments. How can you go wrong? Buy now. Don't wait to inspect the property. Sign now, while it's still cheap.

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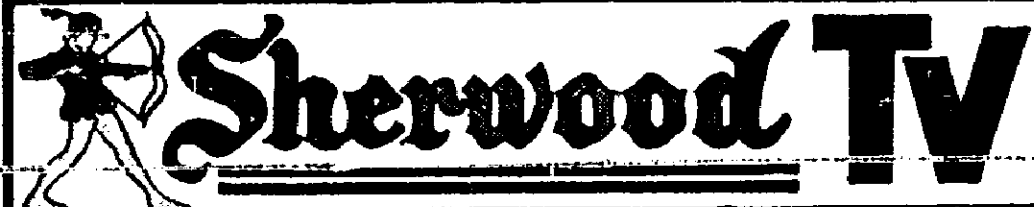

WOMAN'S WORKWORLD

A favorable question: Where to buy supplies wholesale for the crafts or other products you make to sell? Often, fellow craftspeople or crafts magazines supply the supplier answer. Many how-to books list suppliers in the back, but these are generally located on the east or west coast and aren't always wholesale.

Another approach to finding suppliers of ANYTHING is sleuthing in standard business directories. Go to your library and look in "Thomas Register of American Manufacturers" and "McTae's Blue Book." If you don't find what you want in one of those, look in "Guide to American Directories" which is the directories' directory.

Once you locate appropriate manufacturers, write to them asking about prices and minimum orders. Some manufacturers will sell to you direct. Most, however, will think your business potatoes are too small to bother with, and will probably suggest a wholesaler near you.

To buy wholesale, you may have to produce a "resale number" which you get when you register your business venture with the city, county or state agencies in your locale which use registration for the purpose of collecting sales taxes. The wholesale privileges a business resale license carries are well worth its cost.

Two cautions: Don't blow your savings on materials or equipment until you've determined your products will sell (tested the market). Don't splurge on inventory just because you can buy wholesale. Products and materials change, as do customers' tastes, and you don't want to be stuck with too much of a dated thing.

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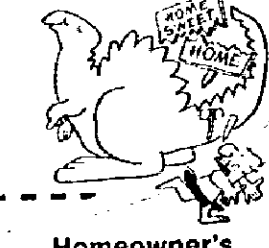

its industries was very advanced on a cooperative local government level," Mrs. Lane continued.

MRS. LANE SAID the purpose of the conference was to bring manufacturing and industrial representatives together with government, administrative and enforcement officials on the subject of pollution control.

The morning session consisted of a closed-circuit telecast from Washington, in which industrial representatives asked EPA officials questions concerning air and water pollution laws, permit applications and other environmental matters.

EPA officials stated that industry can no longer hide in a municipal sewage treatment system. Industry must now pre-treat its waste, and standards for that purpose will be set-up shortly.

MRS. LANE SAID that the afternoon session, which featured a live panel, was a disappointment because all panelists represented industry while no government officials were present.

Because the Ohio Manufacturers' Association has encountered bad experiences with Ohio and U.S. EPA offices, Cleveland was the only Teleconference city which did not have officials available for questions and discussion.

Mrs. Lane said Euclid industrialists also felt the

afternoon session showed too much antagonism. They felt the cooperative working mood set by the first session was lost by comments of disgust and ill feelings between government and industry in the second session.

"I FEEL EUCLID has certainly proved that cooperation between industry and government is important and available from our city," Mrs. Lane said. "Although Euclid is not the state or federal government, we have been able to abate pollution through work, cooperation and confidence."

"It isn't fair for the Ohio Manufacturer's Association to antagonize hostility between government and industry when many areas, such as Euclid and its industry, are proud of its accomplishments."

"It is important that we commend the efforts of industry and government and continue our daily efforts to improve our environment and keep Euclid the safe and healthy community it has always been," Mrs. Lane concluded.

BECAUSE EUCLID DOES have its own program of pollution control, Mrs. Lane said didn't think the Ohio House's recent action to cut the EPA budget from \$31 million to \$21 million would seriously hurt the city.

"It's hard to say what will happen, but I don't expect our programs to diminish as a result," she said.

"We sent the postcards to the persons who signed the petitions only after our office researched the matter very carefully," he continued.

"We heard from a number of residents who said they signed without really knowing what the petition was all about."

"SINCE WE SENT the letters, we received about 30 calls from persons who thanked us for giving them the opportunity to have their names removed."

In the two-page letter which accompanied the postcards mailed to those who signed the petitions, Richard Jacobs, president

of the firm, asked the signers to deposit the cards in the mail immediately if they wished their signature removed.

"On the other hand, if you were aware of the issues posed by the referendum," Jacobs wrote in the letter, "and continue to oppose the development of a regional mall on the Chase Brass property, you should, of course, disregard this letter."

CRANE SAID JACOBS would have sent letters to all persons who signed the petitions but more than 800 names and addresses could not be deciphered.

2 patrolmen fight appearance ruling

Two Euclid policemen has asked the U.S. district court in Cleveland for a restraining order against the Euclid police chief Frank Payne and Captain Warren Goodwin to allow the length of hair, beard and sideburns to be at their own discretion.

They claim the Euclid rules on the limitations are a violation of a persons constitutional rights.

Asking the suit are John McGraw, Thomas Hoiniski and the Cleveland Patrolmen's Association.

"We have a regular procedure which says a man can't have the length

of his hair beyond his coat or over his neck, the mustaches can't be beyond the edge of his mouth and the sideburns can't be below his ears," said Chief Payne.

Payne says they haven't had any problems such as these before.

"We can't tell a man to cut his hair but we don't have to have him work," said Payne. "A man with long hair doesn't look the same when he puts his hat on."

Asked whether he would bend or change the rules Payne answered "Absolutely not."

Judge Niccum dislikes new court procedures

Euclid Municipal Court Judge Robert F. Niccum is not pleased with the new orders for court procedures proposed by the Ohio Rules of Criminal Procedure.

The new rules call for a recording of any criminal

court case via a stenographer, electronic, shorthand or video method. This must be available for anyone in the court who wants it.

THE EUCLID courts have purchased a \$1,500 electronic device. It is

operated by the judge's secretary and by the bailiff. All cases which are put on small records are then filed by date and case.

The court must also start a criminal docket log book and record all criminal

cases except traffic cases.

This policy came into effect on July 1. It was proposed by the Ohio Supreme Court and could have been changed by an amendment from the Ohio legislature if they had decided to act by July 1. They did not, so the new rules are now in effect.

"These rules are set up for the court of common pleas and not for criminal courts," said Niccum.

be turned into the County Auditor for examination.

"The budget that we turn into the county is an inflated one. It has to be that way to cover for any amounts which we may need in the future year. If anyone wants to inspect the budget it is available for analysis," said Davis.

The budget for 1974 is \$14,078,900. Of that amount \$1,616,400 is from the carryover balance from the previous year.

Dr. Houser's term of office has two more years to run. This board will have its seats until the end of the year when the problems of deciding to ask for more money and the negotiations with the teachers and the other salaried employees for the school will have to terminate.

"I FORESEE a tough time in negotiations," said Dr. Sparto DiBiasio. Faced with tax revenue losses, tough minded teacher negotiations and a planned deficit for the upcoming year, he would not hazard a guess on what would happen if a millage issue was turned down by the voters.

THE BOARD passed the budget and the resolution for the amendment to board bill 629 unanimously. Board member Theodore Stepien was not present at the meeting.

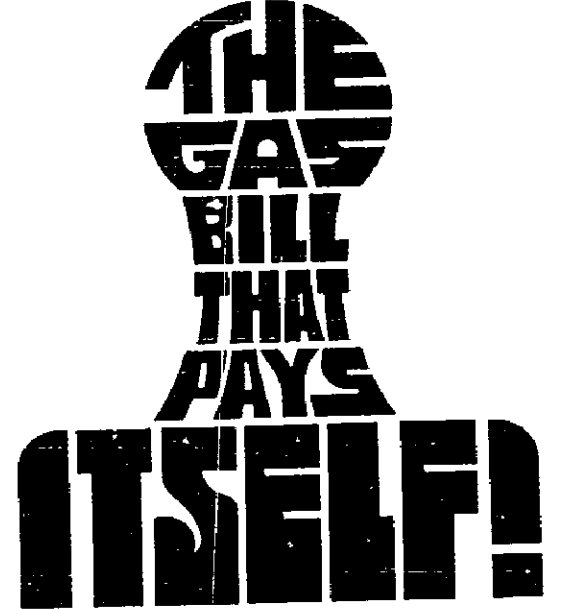
Board President Donald Smith added if the board had decided to act on a levy for this year to satisfy a raise for the teachers it would still have to go to the voters in 1974 for an additional levy.

Sister Francesca McGarry's decision came some 20

years ago when she chose to dedicate her life to God and his children on earth.

"BY BECOMING A NUN I felt I could give myself to people more completely," Sister McGarry said. "I've always been concerned with the sufferings of people, and as a nun I think I can dedicate my life and service to help them live more freely."

Sister Francesca, a Victory Knoll nun, was born in Euclid and attended Holy Cross School before her family moved to Wickliffe where she graduated from the old Willoughby High School.

After attending Ohio University for two years, she went to the Victory Knoll convent in Huntington, Ind. "THE SISTERS OF VICTORY KNOLL do religious, educational and social work," Sister Francesca said. "We work in 20 states and in Latin America."

"There is no convent in Ohio, but I'd like to see one in Cleveland. I think we could do a lot right here." After a three-year training period at the Victory Knoll convent, Sister Francesca was sent to California to work with Mexican-Americans.

AFTER COMING BACK to Slenna Heights College in Michigan, she received her bachelor's degree in sociology in 1955 before going to San Antonio College in Texas where she earned a Master's in 1958.

Being in an order of modern nuns, Sister Francesca wears no veil—something which she feels helps her in her work.

"Since we work mainly in poor and deprived areas, most of our sisters don't wear the stereotyped nun's garb," she said. "Especially in the black communities it seems to make the people more open. When they see us as a person, instead of a nun they tend to talk to us more."

SISTER MCGARRY sees her work as something

which the entire Catholic Church and all religions should unite behind.

"It's the church's role to bring freedom and justice to all men," she said. "We have to develop a social awareness."

"In a place like Euclid, which is isolated from social inadequacies, we have to constantly study and keep tuning in to the suffering of our brothers."

"IF WE ISOLATE ourselves from that, we're getting away from the role of the church."

"In Indiana our order has kept repressive legislation on from passing, and helped to pass some positive types of legislation. Most of that was accomplished by the Indiana Catholic Conference."

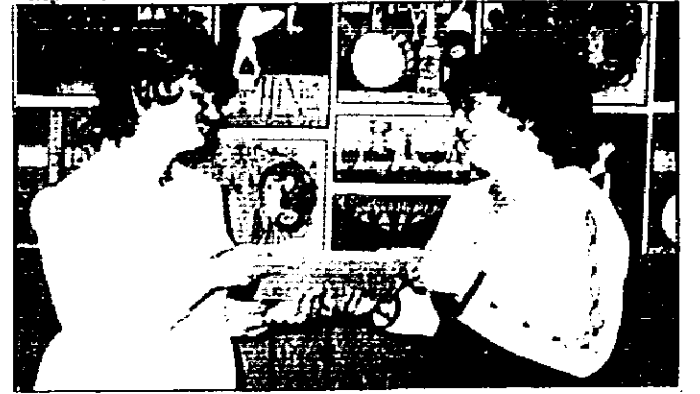
Having been home with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John McGarry, 335 East 235th St., for a two-week vacation, Sister Francesca left Sunday for summer session at Notre Dame University.

WORKING TOWARD A Ph.D., she will attend seminars at Wayne State, Case-Western Reserve, Ohio State and the University of Chicago before returning to Indiana.

"I'm taking a sabbatical to examine and evaluate various social work projects," she said. "Hopefully, I'll learn some new techniques which will aid me in my work."

Though it probably was the most important decision of her life, Sister Francesca said she never regretted the steps she took to become a nun.

"It was a free choice and I can leave the order anytime," she said. "It had to be free to be living as happy and as fully as I am."

MEDICINE CHEST

Which drug is more effective in lowering fever— aspirin or acetaminophen?—C.K.

Both are about the same in fever-reducing effectiveness. A study showed that a combination of aspirin and acetaminophen had more fever-reducing effectiveness than using either drug alone. Researchers at the Tripler Army Medical Center also indicated that a dose of this combination was required every 6 hours instead of the "usual" every 4 hours.

Are you considered deaf if you can hear sounds like music or people talking, but you cannot understand what is being said? I have been told that a hearing aid will not help.—A.J.

An audiologist told me that your type of deafness can be helped with the newest hearing aids. Contact your local hearing and speech center.

Is the concentration of sugar in liquid medicines very high?—N.B.

They sure are! Some 50 to 90 per cent of the volume can be dissolved sugar. A teaspoonful of medicine could have an equivalent of half a cube of sugar. There is no such thing as a "nonallergic" cosmetic. Any substance applied to the skin could have the potential of causing an allergy. Certain cosmetics are considered hypo-allergenic because their ingredients are less likely to cause an allergy.

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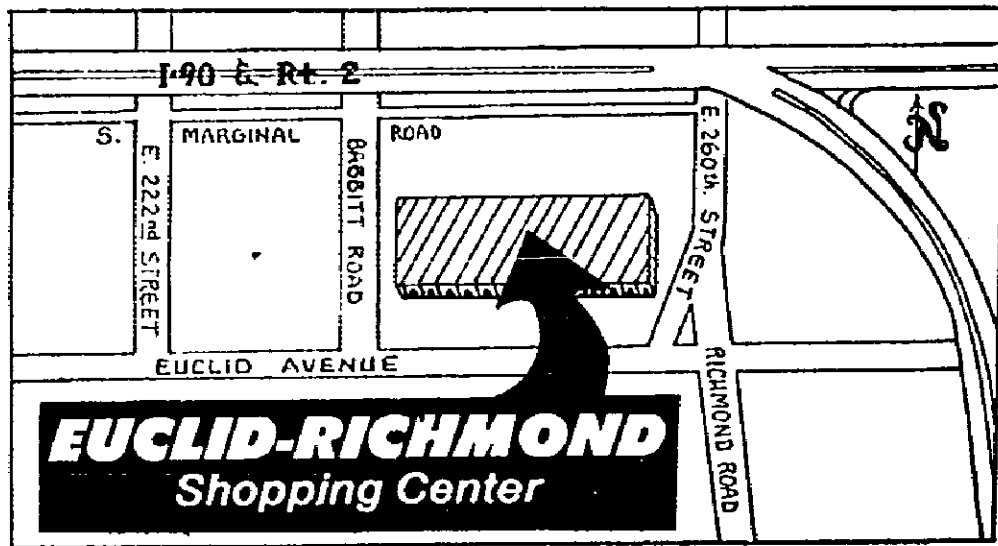

One person who is already impressed with the condition of Euclid's facilities is Joseph Luchansky, director of the Pony League's Eastern Division.

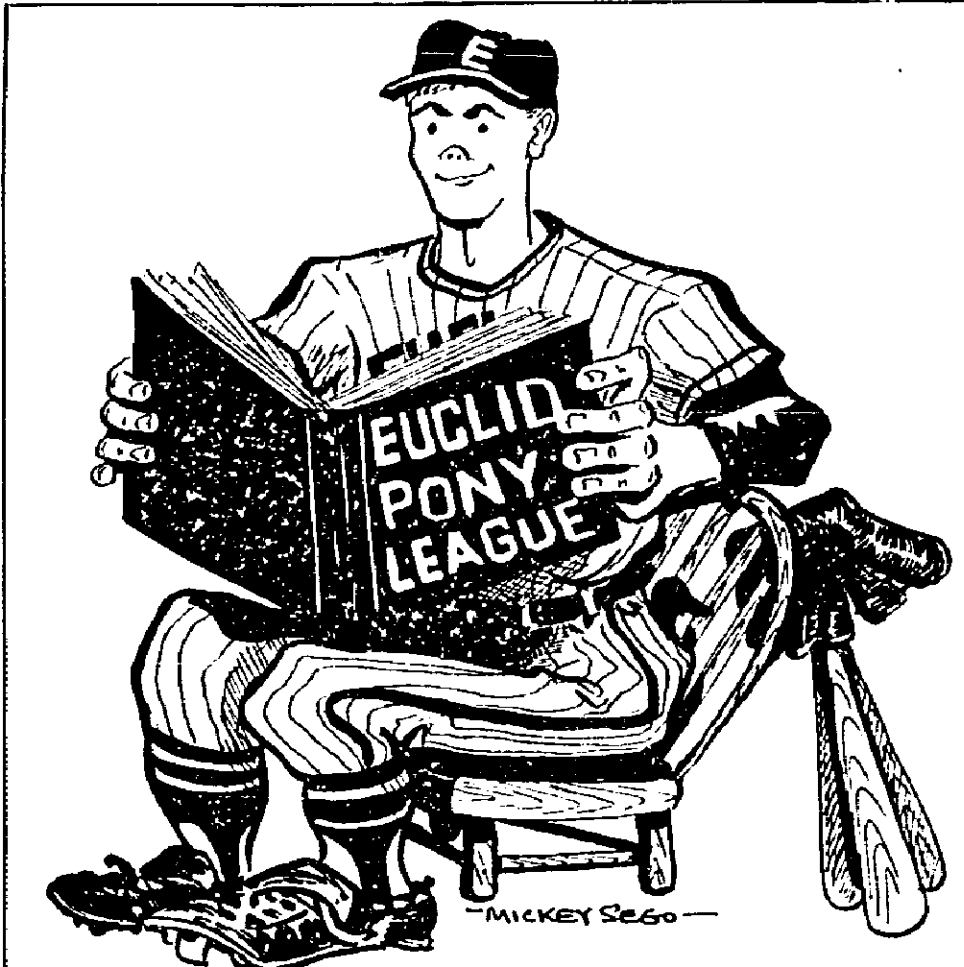
In a recent trip here, Luchansky called diamond three one of the best he's seen anywhere.

Racing is name of the game for Lydic Brothers

In every sport there are a few names that fans recognize. In auto racing, few people are as well known as the Unser Brothers, Al and Bobby.

The immediate area has its own racing brother combination in the form of Lou and Howie Lydic.

THE DYNAMIC DUO race cars in the sports stock class out of their home track, Painsoville Speedway. The bright orange machines of Howie and Lou are marked with the numerals 02 and 2 respectively.

Although the Lydic Brothers may not be as well known as the Unser's in the national scope, any true race fan will tell you of their reputation locally.

LOU IS A THREE YEAR VETERAN while Howie is completing his rookie year as a driver.

"Three years ago we went out and watched a race," replied Howie when asked how they became involved in racing. "and decided to put a car together ourselves just for the heck of it."

That venture three years ago has led to Lou being named 'Rookie-of-the-Year' at Painsoville Speedway in 1970 and a third-place finish in the points standings, a seventh-place position in 1971 and a very successful record in 1972. At present Lou is in the top ten once again, holding down the number nine slot while aiming for the top five.

"THE CAR is really starting to run good now," asserted Howie who also serves as the mechanic for both cars. "We're definitely going to have a very, very successful season this year."

In spite of being a consistent winner and placing in

the top ten, the amateur side of racing is not very lucrative, even for 'pros' that race constantly at the different oval tracks such as Lorain County and Cloverleaf Speedways.

Howie asserted, "It's definitely a hobby and not a money-maker. But it's interesting and keeps you busy."

THE LYDIC BROTHERS have put nearly \$1,000 into each of their machines. A good annual total purse of winnings is around \$500.

"The interesting aspect for us is seeing what we can do against guys who have invested a lot of money in their cars. We do everything ourselves without putting a whole bundle of cash into it."

UNDER THE HOOD of each of the 1965 Chevys lies a 327 cubic inch Chevy mill that, thanks to the talented hands and mind of brother Howie produce 380 horsepower.

"It's the second smallest engine being raced out there, but we're able to keep up with the huge rats without any problems as demonstrated by Lou's victory last Friday in a pursuit race," Howie replied. "Another racer just spent a thousand bucks for a new engine and it blew on him before the second lap was completed."

Both brothers agree that with their limited expenditures the work is tougher.

"THE HARD PART is trying to make standard equipment hold up under racing conditions," remarked Howie. "Just building a car takes at least four months. It has to be reinforced, the engine rebuilt, suspension modified and then tested."

THE LYDIC BROTHERS won't take all the credit for being successful as they are, however. They feel their pit crew is responsible for keeping them in contention.

As the elder Lydic stated, "A good pit crew is 55 percent of the battle. Getting something fixed when you're in trouble and being able to get back into the race right away is what it's all about."

The pit crew consists of Larry Lydic, Lou's son, Al Bellis, and Mike D'Amico.

THERE ARE OTHER members of the Lydic family involved in some form of motor sports competition. Karen Lydic, Howie's 17-year-old daughter is planning to drive in a powder puff race while his son, Tom, at the age of six, wants dad to build him a car. Larry Lydic, Lou's 14-year-old son is one of the best motorcycle hill climbers in the area.

To the Lydic Brothers, racing is a serious hobby. Both contend that the sport is gaining a great deal of class both on and off the track. The fans are no longer coming out to see a fiery crash but to witness skillful driving. The racers themselves have become more sportsmanlike. Both the number of fans as well as the racers has been on the increase for the past several years.

MANY PEOPLE WHO never considered auto racing a sport or the drivers as athletes are turning their opinion about. Many of the regulars at races are doctors, lawyers, teachers as well as the weekday mechanic who races on weekends.

"I'd say the sport is 50 percent technology and 50 percent human element," asserted Howie. Racing is as

competitive as any other sport, if not more so. I don't see how anybody can say it's not a sport."

Lou at the age of 41 and Howie now 43 plan to continue racing for at least another five years.

HOWIE FEELS, "Racing takes away the tension of the day. It's relaxing. He continued, "There's always that butterfly feeling before the race but once the competition begins and the first lap is completed, things settle down."

Advice from the Lydics to anyone who might be contemplating racing is to see someone who is in the sport and also consult the Ohio Racing Association. From there it's all a matter of 'how far do you want to go?'

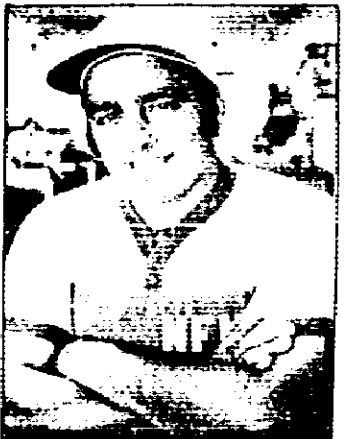
Lou Lydic has been involved with mechanics most of his life, presently working as an automatic transmission specialist for Amco. He resides in Streetsboro with his family.

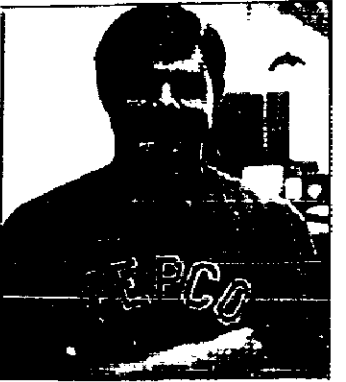

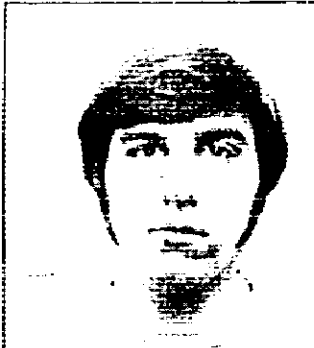

Cleveland State University's always-strong wrestling team will be bolstered by a dozen outstanding recruits next fall, Coach Dick Bonacci announced this week.

Bonacci, who has guided his CSU mat team to a 76-14 dual meet record over the past nine seasons, called the incoming frosh "better than any group of recruits in our history with the possible exception of the group we recruited in 1971."

The 71 recruits contributed five starters (including two All-Americans) to last winter's squad, which finished eighth in the NCAA College Division Championships.

There might be poison in those beautiful plants

You have a beautiful garden, with gorgeous red and lavender rhododendrons, ivy climbing the walls, delphinium and larkspur coming up, star-of-Bethlehem and lilies of the valley in bloom, daffodils just past blooming. It's lovely. And every plant in it is poisonous!

What is a poisonous plant? They are classified generally by their effects:

1. those causing allergies;
2. skin irritation caused by direct contact;
3. internal poisoning caused by eating some part of the plant - leaves, stem, flowers, seeds, etc.; and
4. mechanical injury from sharp spikes or thorns found on many plants.

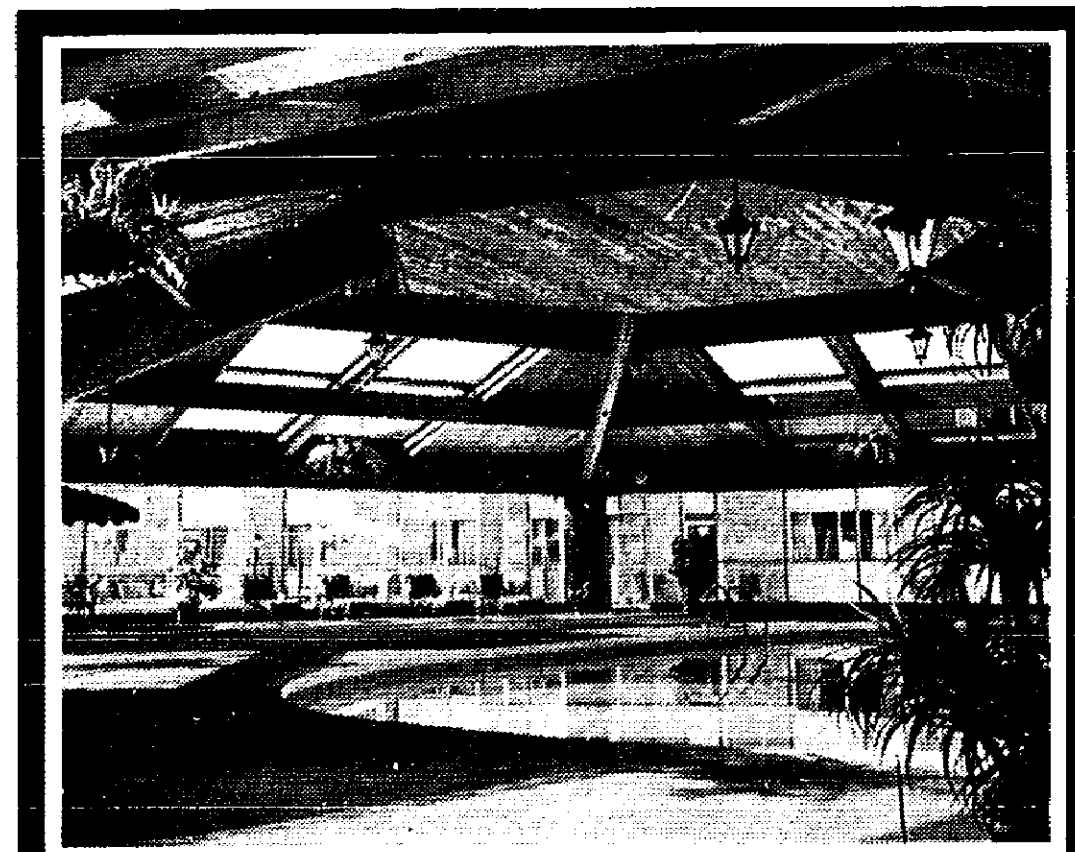
Each year hundreds of people are poisoned by plants, sometimes fatally. Of particular concern are children, whose curiosity often leads them to chew on anything within reach.

Parents to learn more about the poisonous jungle in your back yard, we urge you to visit your Euclid Public Library to learn more about and how to identify these dangerous plants. Two very good books on the subject are: "Human Poisoning from Native and Cultivated Plants," by James W. Hardin and "Daffodils are Dangerous: The Poisonous Plants in Your Garden" by Hubert Creekmore.

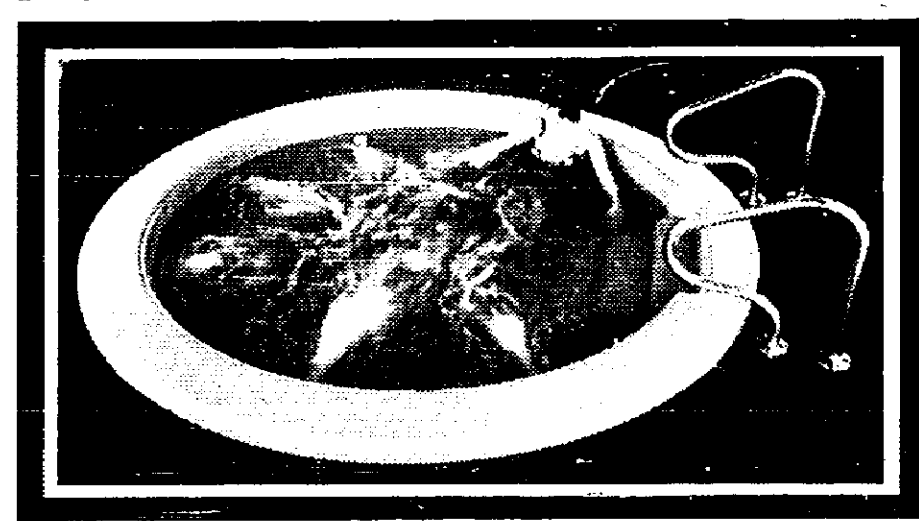

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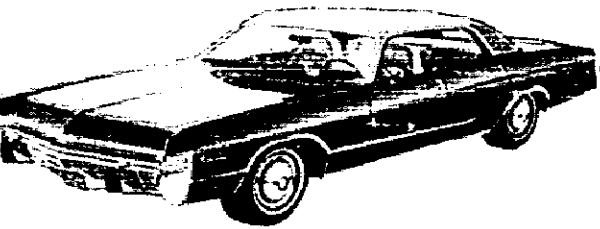
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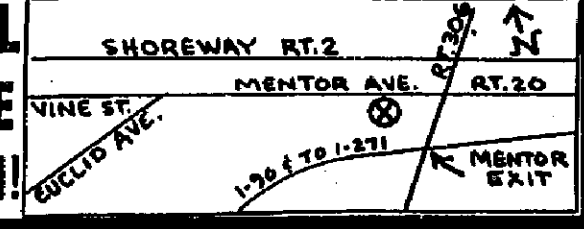
