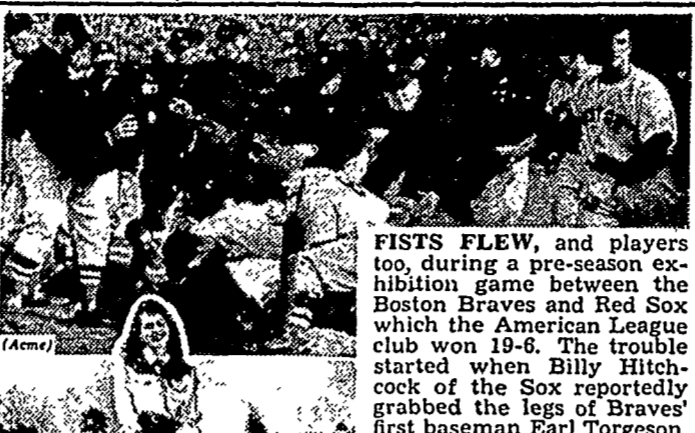

**Women's Legion Post To Honor House Probe Body**

MILWAUKEE, Wis. — The World War II Women's Post 448 of The American Legion of Milwaukee, will hold a testimonial dinner on May 26 to celebrate the tenth anniversary of the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

Miss Cecilia A. Stankiewicz, commander of the post said she hoped other American Legion posts would see fit to honor this Congressional committee which "took it on the chin for ten years until internal treachery became unpopular in America"

The House Committee on Un-American activities came into being in 1938 largely as the result of a resolution adopted by the 19th national convention of The American Legion in New York City in 1937. The committee recently was granted another \$200,000 fund by a house vote of 337 to 37 to continue its work.

**14 Counties Over Farm Bureau Goals**

More than 55,000 Ohio farm families have joined the Ohio Farm Bureau so far this year and fourteen county Farm Bureau organizations have exceeded their goals, according to the latest report issued this week by J. E. Garretson, head of the membership division of the Ohio Farm Bureau.

Garretson said an effort is being made to complete the current drive before May 1, before the heavy farm work starts. He complimented more than 2500 volunteer solicitors making the canvass for their efforts in bringing total farm family membership of the organization almost within the reach of a record and asked that they continue until the goal of 66,000 is reached

Counties exceeding their goals now include Auglaize, Belmont, Franklin, Greene, Knox, Logan, Marion, Ross, Sandusky, Seneca, Shelby, Union, Van Wert and Wood.
